SEES BIG IMPROVEMENT IN BUSINESS FEELING

Colonel Johnson Has Returned From Trip in Northern States.

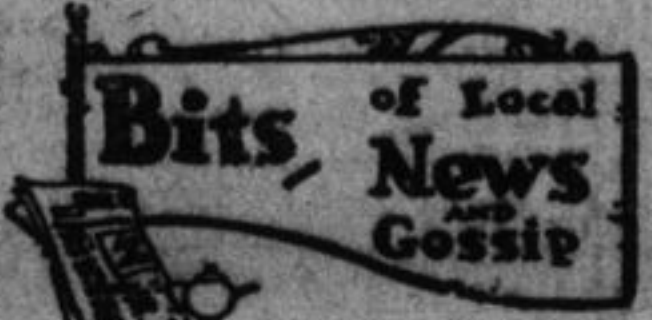
Colonel F. S. S. Johnson, American consul, returned to the city on Thursday after spending a pleasant week at his former home in Vineland, N.J. Colonel Johnson went south to meet Mr. and Mrs. Henry T. Wilcox, the latter of whom is his sister, as they have just returned from Vigo, Spain, where Mr. Wilcox occupies the position of American consul. Mr. Wilcox, until a few months ago, was stationed in the consular office in Paris, France, and is known to a number of Kingstonsians who accepted of his hospitality while there.

Colonel Johnson states that business is recovering splendidly in the states after the severe depression and he found evidences of optimism on every hand. He left Vineland on Wednesday and the Evening Journal had the following remarks to make about his visit.

"Felix S. S. Johnson returns today to his post as U.S. Consul at Kingston, Canada, where he invites all Vineland friends and also all business men to call. Mr. Johnson is enthused with his position and no said before leaving that he was sorry that he could not have addressed the Chamber of Commerce before going home. He says that he often wonders why the people do not call more on their foreign representatives for help in various departments. He is supposed to extend trade for the United States.

"Mr. Johnson particularly mentioned sweet potatoes. They only get seconds in Canada and as far as he can learn only one dealer gets them in his town. He wonders why the Vineland farmers do not try to distribute their products over a wider territory. When told that the distribution of sweet potatoes, peaches and other farm products was a problem often discussed here he said he could see big money in the scheme to reach many towns and communities instead of shipping to the big centres and allowing the speculators to make the money.

"Canadians have to pay five cents or more a slice for American watermelons and they never think of buying a whole one for less than \$1.50 or more. Mr. Johnson would like to help his home town and would be glad to give any information possible in regard to the distribution problem."

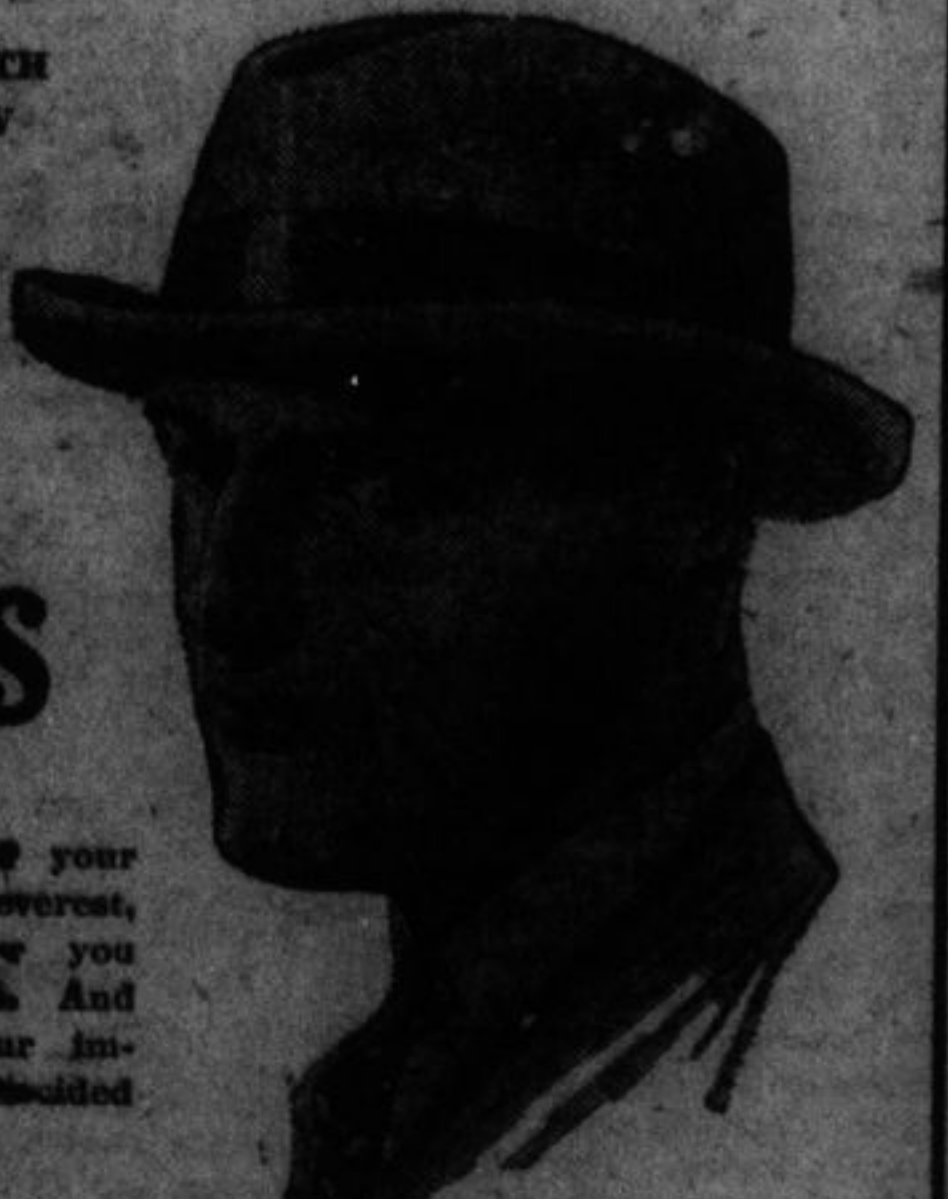
