Sydney, N.S., Sept. 7.—Donald McMillan, the Arctic explorer, and his party of seven followers, arrived in Sydney yesterday on their schooner Bowdoin, after a year in the northern regions. Dr. McMillan came ashore and when seen by newspapermen said that his trip to Baffin Land had been a most successful one. One purpose of his trip north was to penetrate the waters of Fury and Hecla straits where the ships of Captains Parry and Lyons, seekers of the north west passage, were blocked a century ago. In this he was successful. He made an attempt, but like his predecessors in the venture could not force a passage through the frozen ice fields.
