IN MARINE CIRCLES

ANTI-AIRCRAFT GUNS.
May be Mounted to Halt Rum-Smuggling Planes.
Ogdensburg, N.Y., Sept. 8.—Now that the use of aeroplanes to smuggle liquor from Canada to downstate cities has become an assured fact and the dry enforcement agents have to combat this new development, there is every possibility that when the next drive is made against bootleggers in Northern New York by federal patrol units, a system of checking the identity of aeroplane operators will be placed in force and anti-aircraft guns mounted along the border to enforce the dictum of the federal authorities.
An organized ring of rum runners is using a fleet of at least eleven powerful aeroplanes in smuggling liquor into the United States from Canada, according to Zone Chief Appleby of New York and New Jersey. Prohibition authorities also plan to use aeroplanes in trailing the international bootleggers along the air lanes.

\$145,000 Damage Done By Fire in Toronto Plant
Toronto, Sept. 8.—Half of Toronto's fire fighting forces battled for six hours from 3.15 to 9 a.m. today to conquer a fire that ravaged the sausage and lard rooms in the north-west wing of the Swift Canadian Packing plant, Keel and St. Claire streets, resulting in about \$145,000 damage to contents and buildings.

Crews Demand More Pay.
Ogdensburg, N.Y., Sept. 8.—Trouble is reported among the members of crews of various units of the Hall Coal & Transportation Company fleet operating out of this port. Members of the crews demand a higher rate of pay. The average rate has been around \$75 a month and the men demand \$95. As a result of the grievances there may be some inconvenience in operating the vessels carrying coal and pulpwood.
