ALL DOCTORS DIFFERED OVER THE PENSIONS ACT AND DIBITUARY

Chief Medical Officer of Board Chided by Inquiry Commission Chairman.

Ottawa, Sept. 8.—"Slipshod work in the unit, and slipshod work at headquarters, was the manner in which Dr. W. C. Arnold, chief medical adviser to the Board of Pension Commissioners, giving evidence os fore the Royal Commission investigating certain charges made against the Penson Commissioners by the G.W.V.A., characterized certain dehe cause of all the trouble and ro sulted in the charges being made by

Dr. Arnold said that one of greatest difficulties of the Board Pension Commissioners had been to get uniformity of practice, between the medical directors. Col. Ralston. chairman of the Royal Commission observed that Dr. Arnold did not need to emphasize the difficulty of getting uniformity, seeing that every unit director except one seemed to have differed from headquarters.
