ALL DOCTORS DIFFERED OVER THE PENSIONS ACT

Chief Medical Officer of Board Chided by Inquiry Commission Chairman.

Ottawa, Sept. 8.—"Slipshod work in the unit, and slipshod work at headquarters," was the manner in which Dr. W. C. Arnold, chief medical adviser to the Board of Pension Commissioners, giving evidence before the Royal Commission investigating certain charges made against the Pension Commissioners by the G.W.V.A., characterized certain decisions which he intimated had been the cause of all the trouble and resulted in the charges being made by the G.W.V.A. Dr. Arnold said that one of the greatest difficulties of the Board of Pension Commissioners had been to get uniformity of practice, between the medical directors. Col. Ralston, chairman of the Royal Commission, observed that Dr. Arnold did not need to emphasize the difficulty of getting uniformity, seeing that every unit director except one seemed to have differed from headquarters.

Home is Now an Hospital. London, Sept. 8.—Mistress Adeline Patti's beautiful castle in Wales is now a hospital. While the noted singer lived Craig-y-nos Castle was one of the great attractions to tourists in Wales, and people prominent in the world were entertained there by the diva. She did not bequeath it to charity. It was bought by the Welsh National Memorial Association for hospital purposes. The board of governors of the Welsh National Memorial Association paid \$19,000 for Craig-y-nos Castle and converted it into an up-to-date hospital. Following the association's annual meeting at Swansea recently the members proceeded to castle. There Major David Davies, M.P. for Montgomery, formally opened the new hospital in connection with the association.

Park Association Case Adjudged. Watertown, N.Y., Sept. 8.—Hearings in the suit of the Thousand Island Park association against Garfield H. Passenger Record Broken. Southampton, Sept. 8.—The White Star liner Majestic sailed for New York Wednesday carrying 2,266 passengers. Of this number 834 were first class passengers and this is claimed to be the largest number of such passengers ever carried by any Atlantic steamer on either a west-bound or an eastbound trip. The large number was due to the homeward rush of summer tourists.
