KINGSTON GREEKS SEND A RELIEF CONTRIBUTION

To Their Fellow-Countrymen Who Have Been Fighting the Turks.

Mobilization orders have been received by local Greeks to join the army of their homeland to ward off the attacks of the Turks who are now marching on Smyrna in Asia Minor.

However, the sympathies of the local colony are being evidenced in a practical way, and over \$500 of subscriptions for the relief of their fellow countrymen have been raised and forwarded to Greece.

Among those who have realized to the full the meaning of the struggle is Peter Poyles, who served for ten years in the Greek army fighting the Turks. Mr. Poyles, who is now employed in Pappas' cigar store, Princess street, was released from the army thirteen months ago and has been in Kingston for some time.

PRINCIPAL GRANT'S VIEW

As Far Back as 1875 He Favored Church Union.

"Presbyter" writes in the Presbyterian Witness:

About church union, and opinions thereof, one has often heard the question—"What would be the attitude of Principal Grant were he still with us? In foresight, and in breadth of sympathy and sense he stood with the first men of his day, and were he amongst us now, it is safe to say that he would occupy the same rank.

The writer heard him address the Kirk Synod of Ontario and Quebec, on the eve of the Presbyterian union of 1875. He was Moderator of the Kirk of the maritime provinces, and up to the time minister of St. Matthew's church, Halifax, a Britisher, Canadian, Confederalist, and Presbyterian of the first water.

Not a few of his own branch of Presbyterianism refused to accompany him into the union of 1875, but he was right and they were wholly wrong. Let his judgement stand.

ROADS ABOUT KINGSTON IN FAIRLY GOOD SHAPE

Sections Further West Are Reported Much the Worse For Wear.

Reports of travelers over the roads in the vicinity state that while they are in comparatively good condition they certainly show the effect of the summer's traffic. STUDENTS LOOK FORWARD TO SPLENDID SESSION

They Are Hoping For a Lively Time With Sports and Amusements.

Queen's students in the opening of the college the end of the month are looking forward to one of the best sessions in years. Last winter an energetic few gained the sympathies of the Alma Mater Society and as a result a number of doings, peculiarly student, will again liven the fall and winter months.

The students' parade, which has been a looked-for event by the citizens, the students' theatre night, which was replaced by the "Frolic" last spring, the old time of elections, when faculty was pitted against faculty are all on the bill for the students to revel in.

In the few years during and following the war's number of these annual events became to be regarded as expensive frivolities and legislation through the Alma Mater Society changed them so that students returning from overseas scarcely recognized the events which had meant much in the pre-war days. The students' parade, because of the expense connected with it, was postponed indefinitely; the election bills for advertising were curtailed so greatly that little campaigning was done; the dramatic club decided to more strictly live up to its ideals; and finally the rush was nothing but a name.

Some of the students claimed that these events were "dead" and a group of "reformers," prominent among whom were the "Honorable Bohemvik" moved for a return to pre-war policies in regard to these affairs.

So as a result of legislation last winter a slightly modified form of rush will be the means of initiation used on the freshmen of the fall's classes. The students' parade is scheduled to be held; a better frolic, if possible, than was given last winter will be billed for theatre night; and elections will likely be filled with all the old-time faculty spirit.

The students will also be particularly interested in athletics. One of the last things which they did at a mass meeting before leaving the university last spring was to levy a sixty per cent. increase on athletic fees so that the Athletic Board of Control might be on a better financial footing. Any body that will voluntarily do that are certainly interested.
