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HORTICULTURAL EXHIBITION

Opens in Island Market Building—The Exhibits Are
Very Fine.

The annual exhibition of the Kingston Horticultural Society was opened in the Island market building Tuesday and will continue Wednesday. The building, where the exhibits are to be seen, will be open to the public during the afternoons and evenings.

In addition to the very large exhibit of beautiful flowers of different kinds, there is an exceptionally fine display of fruit, including different varieties of apples, thirty-one kinds being represented; pears, plums and grapes, all the product of local industry. The vegetables shown are salsify, cauliflower, cabbage, carrots, celery, capsicums, cucumbers, corn, beet egg plant, garlic, herbs, horse radish onions, potatoes, tomatoes, turnips, squash, parsnips, vegetable marrow, melons, citron pumpkins.

Special prizes are offered for the best collection of vegetables, best collection of fruit. Some of the collections are wonderful, and a high tribute to the ability of the competitors.

Among the plants are ferns, asparagus, coleus, cannas, Fuchsias, geraniums, palms, begonias, rubber plant, hydrangia. The cut flowers consist of the best late summer flowering plants, represented by asters, antirrhinum, annuals, sweet peas, coxcomb, dahlias, dianthus, gladiolus, hydrangea, geraniums, marigolds, pansies, perennials, petunias, phlox, roses, stock, verbena, zinnias. Many of these beautiful flowers are shown in designs. Money prizes are offered and the judges will begin to make their inspection tomorrow and their awards will be made in the afternoon.

The Kingston Horticultural Society has grown in numbers and the character of the exhibits has steadily improved from year to year. Its influence has stimulated interest among the local amateur and professional gardeners with wonderful results. All who are interested in horticulture should visit this exhibition which in a most wonderful display and cannot be surpassed anywhere.
