Twin Teachers For London Collegiate Graduates of Queen's University



The above is a photograph of two young men, both graduates of Queen's University, who have been appointed on the teaching staff at the Collegiate Institute staff at London, Ont. SALVATION ARMY CITADEL

A Stirring Address Given by Ensign Madele Wilson, of New York.

Harvest Thanksgiving services were held by the Salvation Army on Sunday and stirring sermons appropriate to the occasion were given by Ensign Madele Wilson who conducted the services at the Citadel in the morning, and at 7:30 o'clock in the evening. All were largely attended and the hall was beautifully decorated with flowers, fruits and vegetables kindly donated by members and friends.

The street parade was a memorable one, the band, the members and officers being present in full force. It was Ensign Wilson's last Sunday in the city and she holds such a warm place in the affections of the rank and file that none could be absent. The feelings of all were fittingly expressed by Adjutant Conde during the evening service when he referred to Ensign Wilson's brief stay in Kingston and her departure for New York this week where she fills an important office in the organization.

Speaking at the evening service from St. Luke VI: 44, "For every tree is known by its own fruit," Ensign Wilson made an eloquent appeal for consistency in the Christian life.

"There is no good in one trying to deceive oneself," she said, "respecting one's real character, for when it is revealed in smallness and pettiness, it shows the man or woman to be small. This is how they appear to the outside world, and prove the truth of the saying 'by their fruits ye shall know them.' It is futile to think that you can make an impression for good unless the seed of love is in your heart. In your spiritual life you will reap what you sow. There is a right and unselfish purpose in life for everyone and you must look and find what God's purpose is. It is when men are vitally concerned about the kingdom of God, rather than about personal petty things, that they are able to give their best service to Him. If you are going to fight, fight for something that is worth fighting for. How can men and women sow the seed of bitterness, unfaithfulness, and enmity and expect to reap the peace of God? It is humanly impossible and divinely impossible for every tree to be known by its own fruits."

"Consecration to a definite purpose is the only Christian way, for life is intended for a particular purpose by God and He calls us to fulfill that purpose. To the man or woman who will not follow God there comes disappointment from disobedience, and this brings defeat; and defeat not only crushes your soul, but also all of the influence for good you might have had on the lives of others. If I left the Salvation Army I would hurt more souls than I ever could have saved during the period of my life."

Industry. We ought so to live that no act of ours could bring a blush of shame. When we started out with a profession and came to Christ we said that we would follow every step of the way. Are we with Him tonight? Here the speaker showered the mistake that many make of changing from the true course and then pleading self-defence. "That is just what the backslider does invariably. You cannot join the service and obey the call of God for a little while. If you are fighting for a cause and die in the attempt you know there are comrades who will carry on like the soldiers of the Canadian army in France who said 'If ye break faith we shall not sleep though poppies blow in Flanders fields.' If I played false to the Army I would feel ashamed to die. Some of us have given up more than you will ever get by seeking after worldly pleasures and material things. In fifteen minutes helping souls to God you live more than you do while pursuing luxury.

"There is a sensitiveness born of a guilty consciousness in a person who is not following the religious life. This is shown by self-defence. Never use self-defence, for your friends don't need it and your enemies would not believe it. God knows you and the people who are looking at you judge you from what you are in your conduct. Indifference is the paralysis of the soul. What are you going to do? God permits the evil and the good to grow together until the harvest—the sinner and the saint. The Christian's life is one of service—to hold his own in the world and not be of it.

"The important question to settle is what is your relationship to God. Having settled it with God are you maintaining and fulfilling it? The answer is found in your conversation. It is here that your life speaks. If you live a humble life men and women will feel your influence; and remember always that God can so sanctify your very suffering, meekness and endurance for the benefit of the lives of others, and bless your steadfastness in the faithfulness of others."
