Inside the main exhibition building there may be heard hundreds of different noises, all brought forth by bustling activities in erecting and decorating booths in preparation for the big event.

Hammering, sawing, the rat-a-tat-tat of tack hammers, shouted directions, good-natured chaffing from one booth to another, borrowing and lending, in some cases sly pilfering of odds and ends of wood or equipment, all mingle together as the harbingers of Kingston's one and only fair.

Out in the big oval inside the track there is even greater activity as the employees of the big midway shows hurry around in frenetic activity to get their different attractions in good working order in time for the opening day.

The midway, like the other sections of the exhibition, looks bigger and better than ever also and there will be some happy hours spent on it.

The other departments are all filling up rapidly and entrants bringing in their exhibits and prize conditions. All branches of the big show will be filled to overflowing and things look bright indeed.

Even the worst weather would have a hard time spoiling the programme now and everybody is pulling for sunshine.

Several horses have been on the track during the past two or three days, getting into shape for the trials of speed. There will be some fast heats and hot contests for a share of the big purses offered.

The entries for the different heats look good and great interest is centering in the horses entered.

Altogether things look fine and there is a big smile all over "Boj" Bushell's face. Crowds of the spectators have been passing in and out of the gates all day to watch the progress of construction and assembling and capacity crowds are expected from the opening hour to the closing on Saturday night.
