comes from, although the tourists  
who come to the city leave much of

here since it is rarely sent in bulk.  
At the present time there is a sur-  
plus of small change, and shipments  
will be sent from the chartered

bank branches here from time to  
time. This involves heavy expendi-  
ture for crating and express charges,  
but is one of the necessary func-  
tions of the banks in the city.

One of the measures adopted by  
the finance department to bring the  
conversion proposals, which are now

bonds was the mailing of registered

any branch of any chartered bank,  
signifying the maturity of the new

plies. "Everything has been so satis-  
fying that I would like the invest-  
ment to continue," wrote one hold-  
er and there have been many letters  
of like tenor from persons who be-  
came investors in bonds for the first  
time in 1917.
