Has Arrived in Athens.
Miss Annie Gordon, a Queen's graduate, who has been teaching in Smyrna under the auspices of the Boston board of missions, has cabled her sister, Miss Sara Gordon, Toronto, that she has arrived safely in Athens after the destruction of Smyrna.

Fire at Brockville.
Fire broke out about two o'clock Monday afternoon in an old building on the property of the James Smart plant, Canada Foundries & Forgings, Ltd., Brockville, which is used as a store house, and burned for over half an hour before brought under complete control. The cause of the fire is at present unknown.

On Sunday, Sept. 17th, there passed away at his late residence, Wilton, a well-known resident, in the person of Milton Fliske Parrott in his fifty-fifth year. Mr. Parrott had been in poor health for some time, but was confined to his bed only about ten days.

Deceased was born in Wilton, township of Ernestown, and was the only son of the late Wesley Parrott and Maria Fliske, and the only grandson of Daniel Parrott. His ancestry

was of the U. E. L. stock and he was a direct descendant of Col. James Parrott, who built one of the first Methodist churches in Upper Canada.

Deceased is survived by his wife, formerly Ida Hicks, three sons and two daughters, also two sisters, Mrs. Guy Simmons and Mrs. John Carr, all of Wilton.

Convict in Ugly Mood.
A despatch from Chatham has the following: "High Constable Peters and Provost Officer Lowe have returned from Kingston, after escorting Clayton Croft to the penitentiary to serve his life sentence. Croft was in an ugly mood during the entire trip, according to the officers.
