

Germany to Abolish the Death Sentence

Berlin, Sept. 26 .- Forthcoming changes in the laws of Germany will abolish the death sentence and sentences to the penitentiary and will make divorce easy. The workers will have their own courts in which the juries will be composed of their fellow-workers.

So Minister of Justice Radbrusch has announced before the Socialist conference at Augsburg. Herr Radbrusch said the new laws will move all distinction between penitentiary and jail offences, which a distinction between a felon and a minor criminal.
