SENSATIONAL CASES ARE TO BE RECALLED

Charges Against Upton Boys and Fred Bryant Before Supreme Court.

The sensational cases, in which Fred Bryant and Sherwood and Erwood Upton are charged with being implicated, will be recalled at the sessions of the supreme court, which opened in Kingston Tuesday afternoon, before Justice Orde.

According to the court calendar, Fred Bryant is to answer to a charge of murder, following the killing of night Constable Richard A. Beard, at Napanee, early on the morning of August 28th, 1921. The Upton boys have already pleaded guilty to a charge of manslaughter in the case of the killing of the Napanee constable. They were remanded for sentence, and it is understood they will be sentenced at this session of the court, after the case against Bryant has been disposed of.

T. J. Rigney, K.C. is counsel for Bryant, and A. B. Cunningham and C. M. Smith are appearing for the Upton boys.

At the June sessions Fred Bryant pleaded guilty to a charge of shooting at Detective James Cotter, on the Perth Road, on September 16th, 1921, and on this charge was sentenced to seven years in the Portsmouth penitentiary.

Bryant also pleaded guilty to breaking into Mahood Bros. store and stealing a quantity of goods on October 31st, 1921, and on this charge was given two years in the penitentiary, the sentence to run concurrently with the other sentence.

The Upton boys are at the present time serving a four-year sentence for theft. Erwood was found guilty of theft from L. T. Best's drug store, while his brother was found guilty of stealing from Chown's hardware store.

The Upton boys are twins, in their 21st year, while Bryant is in his 22nd year.
