What the Press Agents Say About Coming Attractions

To-night "The Bird of Paradise." "The Bird of Paradise" will come to the Grand Opera House to-night with a cast of unusual merit. QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY SESSION IS OPEN

And There is a Rush by the Students to Register.
 Queen's opened its 82nd session in arts; its 70th session in medicine and its 30th session in science, Wednesday morning. Classes started in all three faculties and registration in arts and science opened.
 Hundreds of students were registered Wednesday. No estimate of the total of the registration could be given by the staff. While about a week is given for registration, all students are anxious to be registered before Friday as after that date a special fee is charged.
 The indications are now that the registration will likely be as large as last year, though there is a possibility that the freshman year in the faculty of arts may not be as large as last year. About forty have registered in first year science but this does not equal last year's registration. However, more registrations will be received.
 The staff of the faculties is now nearly up to strength. Prof. Henry Alexander and R. Watt having recently arrived. Many of the lecturers will not start until the end of the week.

RUSSIA INADMISSIBLE TO VENICE CONFERENCE

Britain Holds It Is Continuation of Conference Resulting in Sevres Treaty.
 London, Sept. 27.—The British reply to the demand of Russia to be included in the proposed conference at Venice, will be that this conference is a continuation of the negotiation and the conference which resulted in the treaty of Sevres. It was stated in official circles today. The participants to the new conference are powers which concluded the latter treaty, it was further declared.
 On this ground, Russia is inadmissible, it is declared in foreign office quarters. In regard to the control of the straits, they will be conceded to the league of nations, and all that will be necessary for Russia to do to share in their usefulness will be to become civilized and join the league, it was stated.
