THE NEAR EAST.

Oscar S. Straus, for several years a United States minister and an ambassador to Turkey, sees danger in the present crisis in the Near East. Though not an alarmist, Mr. Straus fears what may happen, and his fears are based on his knowledge of the situation there.

First, Turkey, Russia and Germany could form a powerful alliance against the Allied forces. Second, the United States, for its own interest, may be compelled to intervene. Third, a general conflagration can be avoided only by Great Britain, France and Italy coming to an agreement, and by a material revision of the Versailles treaty.

Fourth, the United States, a member of the League of Nations, under any reservations, could have prevented the present crisis. Fifth, Venezuela should be returned to power.

The Watertown Times agrees that there is nothing drastic in these views of Mr. Straus. It can easily be seen, of course, that a combination of Turkey, Russia and Germany would be a dangerous one.

The whole question seems one upon which the Allies must come to agreement; and while sentiment in Canada is wholly in favor of the interests of the mother country, and the desirability of securing the execution of a treaty favorable to her interests that are identified with the welfare of Europe and the minorities in need of protection, the policy of sending Canadian soldiers to Turkey in the event of hostilities is a proper subject for the deliberation of parliament.

"It is generally agreed that the weak spot in the programme of the Allies is that they are not standing together. Great Britain faces the Turk alone, declaring that he must not menace the peace of Europe. Italy and France are holding back playing international politics. The position of Great Britain is far more admirable."

THE EX-KAISER'S MARRIAGE. The report that ex-kaiser William is to be married a second time on Nov. 5th has apparently caused quite a sensation amongst his relatives and others who have been close to him since his exile.

A TREATY OR NOT A TREATY? Hon. Arthur Meighen is endeavoring to find in the resolution passed by parliament last June authorizing the government to take the necessary measures to give effect to the treaty of Sevres, a pretext for Canada's active participation in a war against Turkey.

This is the actual situation regardless of what discussion may have taken place in the Canadian parliament; and while Sir George Perley signed the treaty on behalf of Canada, parliament's approval

does not alter it one way or another. The whole controversy now before the public is futile in view of the fact that Turkey never engaged herself to the fulfillment of the Sevres Treaty.

Lloyd George in a statement issued to the press on the 24th inst. respecting the British policy in the Near East never once refers to the Treaty of Sevres, but he does emphasize the terms of the armistice signed on October 30th, 1918, providing for the opening of the Dardanelles and Allied occupation of the straits and Bosphorus ports, and it is under the terms of the armistice that the Allied powers are still in occupation.

Our Canadian Question And Answer Corner

Q.—What is the Advisory Council for Scientific Research of Canada?

A.—The Honorary Advisory Council for Scientific Research of Canada has for its aim the promotion of the development of the industries of the dominion, the utilization of its natural resources and the creation of the wealth necessary to lighten Canada's burden of debt. Its report for 1921 deals with eight different subjects.

Q.—To what extent is Canada carrying out a good roads programme?

A.—Canada is spending fifty millions on good roads, twenty millions having been voted by the Dominion Parliament on condition that the provinces spend thirty millions, which is being done (1922).

CURED OF BROKEN NECK IN TWO WEEKS' TIME The Marvellous Recovery of Man Injured While He Was Diving.

Chicago, Sept. 28.—While swimming in the lake two weeks ago, Basil Wallace, twenty-seven years old, a printer, dived off a pier and broke his neck. To-day he sits in his room in the Polytechnic Hospital practically recovered and soon will be discharged as cured.

X-ray examination revealed that the second, third and fourth vertebrae of the spinal column had been fractured and thrown out of line. Doctors Irving Perrill and B. L. T. Woods decided on an immediate plan to stretch the man's neck back into a normal position and relieve the pressure.

Wallace was placed in a specially constructed bed where he lay with his head supported by two pillars in an angular position. The doctors then placed a strap around his head, under the chin, and fastened it securely. A rope was tied to the strap and thrown over the head of the bed. A sack filled with sand weighing ten pounds was tied to the rope and allowed to hang down, thereby throwing weight on the rope and pulling the man's head away from his body. Wallace was forced to stay in this position for two weeks. To-day he sat up relieved of pain and paralysis.

HAD MANY QUARRELS WITH HER HUSBAND Accused of Paying Too Much Attention to Her Church and Pastor.

New Brunswick, N.J., Sept. 28.—Discovery of a witness who claimed to have heard frequent quarrels between Mrs. Eleanor Reinhardt Mills and her husband James Mills, over Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall, yesterday led authorities investigating the double murder of the rector and his choir leader to subject Mills to another long grilling.

Mills has maintained, since the bodies were discovered a week ago last Saturday, that he had no suspicions concerning the relations between the slain pair—now reported to have planned an elopement to Japan.

Mills' 16-year-old daughter, Charlotte, also was examined again at length. When the two left the courtroom, Prosecutor Bookman, of Somerset, said that while some progress had been made toward solution of the mystery it was not as much as had been hoped for.

COAL FOR CORNWALL. Carload of Chestnut Anthracite at \$16 Per Ton. Cornwall, Sept. 28.—Yesterday A. F. Mulhern received the first carload of American anthracite to reach Cornwall since the strike. It contained forty-five tons of chestnut and is being disposed of to his customers at \$14 a ton. Mr. Mulhern has egg and stove coal on the way and says he will soon be able to attend to all the wants of his customers.

The second car to reach Cornwall was received by the Lally Coal and Wood Company. It is of the egg variety and is also being retailed at \$16 per ton. Other dealers have consignments on the way.

Clayton Woman Dies. Clayton, N.Y., Sept. 28.—Mrs. Mary Rogers Heidt died at her home in the Hambley block in this village after an illness of several weeks. Mrs. Heidt was the widow of Bernard Heidt of Clayton and has been 89 years. She leaves no blood relatives.
