### IS SEEKING DAMAGES FOLLOWING AUTO SMASH

#### Aftermath of Collision Between "Black Maria" and Edmund Aikens' Car.

An aftermath of an automobile collision, which occurred on November 26th, 1921, at the corner of Barrie and Brock streets, was heard in the supreme court, before Justice Orde, on Friday night. On the date mentioned, a collision occurred between the "Black Maria," of the Kingston police department and an automobile driven by Edmund Aikens.

As a result of the smash, Aikens entered an action against the corporation of the city of Kingston and the board of police commissioners of the city of Kingston for \$3,000 damages for injuries sustained.

The case commenced at 8 o'clock, and the taking of evidence and hearing of argument concluded at midnight, when Justice Orde reserved judgment.

A. B. Cunningham, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff, and T. J. Rigney, K.C., for the defendants. This case concluded the business of the court. Edmund Aikens was driving over Barrie street, from Princess, and the police patrol was going up Brock street, in response to a hurry-up call given the department that robbers had been in the home of a woman named Clark, who resided on Brock street.

Aikens was the first witness, and he swore that he had the right of way, and that he was only travelling about eight or nine miles an hour, and that the police patrol was going about thirty-five miles an hour, in his estimation. Plaintiff said that after the two collided, the police car struck a pole. He received injuries which confined him to his bed for three weeks, and was off work for four months as a result of the injuries he received.

Witness said that he paid out \$100 for doctor's attention, and estimated the damage to his car as \$750. Mr. Cunningham presented photographs of the damaged car to the court. The car cost him \$717.

#### "Black Maria" Had Speed.

Ernest Swaine witnessed the accident, when at the corner of Brock and Barrie streets. Witness said the police patrol was travelling at an excessive rate of speed, about thirty-two miles an hour. The other car was travelling about nine or ten miles an hour. Witness said that he noticed the two cars before the collision, and felt sure that there would be an accident. Witness declared that the accident was due to excessive speed on the part of the police patrol.

Mrs. Sarah Corrigan, who witnessed the accident, said that the police patrol was going at a fast rate of speed, but could not give an estimate of the speed.

William Sutherland, who was in the plaintiff's car, said he was riding in the back seat, but did not know what had struck the car until some time after the accident. The plaintiff's car was only travelling about eight or ten miles an hour.

Fred O'Neill, another passenger in the plaintiff's car at the time of the accident, estimated the speed of the police patrol at thirty-five miles an hour, and put the blame for the accident on the excessive speed at which the police car was travelling.

J. A. Macfarlane, merchant, witnessed the accident. He said the "Black Maria" was travelling fast, and he looked for a smash with the other car. He estimated the speed of the police car at twenty-five or thirty miles. Witness heard the horn sounded on the police car.

Samuel Turner, another witness of the accident, estimated the speed of the police patrol at thirty or thirty-five miles an hour, and thought the speed of the car had been responsible for the accident.

Dr. E. C. D. McCallum, said he attended the plaintiff after the accident and told about his injuries. He suffered injuries to his shoulder, was in bed two weeks and incapacitated for six or eight weeks.

Mr. Whitney, a garage man, said the car owned by the plaintiff was worth between \$700 and \$800 before the accident.

Gordon Ronay, said that he had estimated the damage to the car at \$700.

Dr. D. E. Mundell and Dr. Quilley submitted reports on injuries received by the plaintiff.

#### Evidence of Constables.

Constable Vernon Campbell said he was driving the police car when it figured in the collision. He had been driving the car for some time before the accident, and had considerable experience in operating cars. Witness told of the hurry-up call the police got and said that while driving up Brock street, he had been sounding the horn. He was travelling fifteen or twenty miles an hour. On reaching Barrie street he looked to the right, and could see Aikens' car approaching. When witness got half way across Barrie street, the car driven by Aikens ran into the police car. Witness was thrown out of the car but escaped injury. His coat was torn.

Constable Fitzgerald, who was riding in the police car, said the "Black Maria" was travelling about fifteen or twenty miles an hour.

Other witnesses called to give evidence included H. C. Nichol, Robert Greenless, Thomas Antrors and Chief of Police Robinson.

Mr. Cunningham contended that the accident had been brought about as a result of a violation of a section of the Motor Vehicle Act, in that the police car was travelling at an excessive rate of speed.
