A Column Admirer: "Please tell me if there is a way to remove cinders from the lining of stoves without injuring the lining or breaking it."

Answer: Yes. Burn oyster shells on top of the coal. This loosens the cinders.

Helen M.: "I. What do you think would be a nice gift for a couple on their first wedding anniversary? 2. What will take a blue stain (caused by a stocking) out of a man's soft collar?"

Answer: 1. As the first wedding anniversary is the Cotton Wedding, it would be suitable for you to give the young couple any article for table use, or home decoration, made of cotton cloth. 2. Try Javelle water (which can be bought at a drug store.) If this does not take the stain out, I am afraid nothing will. Mrs. B. E. B.: "Not long ago one of your readers asked for directions for Rickerack Edging. Here are mine. Chain 6, 4 d c in 3rd st. from hook. Chain 2, 1 d c in same stitch. Chain 3, 1 tr in end of first chain. Chain three, turn. Second row: 6 d c under 2 ch of last row. Ch 3, turn. Third Row: 4 d c between last 2 d c. Ch 2, 1 d c in same place. Chain 3, tr in first d c of preceding row. Ch 2. Repeat from 2nd row.

Answer: Thank you, Reader Friend. I am sure all of our readers enjoy trying such excellent contributions.

Mrs. S.: "I am 35 years old and here is my method of canning corn, which I have used for years with good results: Nine cups of corn cut fine from cob, one cup of sugar, a scant quarter of a cup of salt, two cups of boiling water. Boil all together for 12 minutes (after it begins to boil.) Put in jars piping hot. Seal at once. I have never lost a jar."

TWO YOUTHFUL EVENING FROCKS

Here are two very smart and very new frocks which are ideal evening modes for the girl who is at college. Every college girl finds a velvet dress becoming and useful, and the current-red of this model makes it fit better into the background of winter evenings. The other combines chiffon and tulle in apricot shade.

For dinner or for more dressy dance occasions, the young girl needs at least one frock with sleeves. If she is at boarding school the sleeves are often a requirement. The lines of this current-red velvet, creating gown are essentially becoming, and its trimming adds to its individuality.

Padded velvet flowers in the same rich shade girdle the frock, while cream lace forms the collar and drops in a wash at the side. The lace mesh is most effective against the velvet.

Apricot tulle forms the simple bodice of the other dance frock. Its skirt is built of rows of slightly full-edged chiffon joined to each other by cording.

Carrying out the same idea as the padded flowers on velvet, are the grapes which grace this model at shoulder and hip. They are of changeable tulle, the color of pink grapes, and they show the realistic purple tint of pink grapes when held up to the sun.

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
