THREE OFFERS OF TERRITORY MADE TO TURKEY BY ALLIES. In 1920 the allies, per the treaty of Sevres, offers Turkey the small shaded area of ter-

ritory on the right of the map. In March of this year they agreed to give her the area as far westward as Ganos, with the concurrence of Greece, but arrangements for an armistice with Greece fell through. Now the allies, with Greece protesting, are promising Turkey all the land over to Enos, or Turkey-in-Europe, as it was in 1913. The map indicates the sector along the Dardanelles at Chanak which the British have fortified. The Turks hold the rest. The entrenched British line at Ismid is also shown.
