It is only one hundred years since the first statute specifically prohibiting cruelty to animals was written; but long before there was a higher, law-the law enforced by the conscience—to restrain men and women that is the method of making school from inflicting unnecessary pain on the lower creatures. William Cowper, who died in 1800, wrote:

And nearly 2,000 years before Cowper's time a great Teacher, in the Sermon on the Mount, exalted the quality of mercy, on which all laws for the prevention of cruelty to animals are based.

An opponent of the British act of 1822, deriding it in a speech before parliament, suggested that the next thing would be to punish people for boiling live lobsters. Humane laws have not reached that point yet, but the suggestion is not so absurd as if seemed at that time.

go, however, before needless cruelty

to animals will be eliminated. Trap-

pers still catch fur-bearing animals in steel traps that keep the victims alive and suffering, their legs caught between toothed jaws which hold them in a crushing grip. But humanitarians are protesting against the practice, and steadily are proseing in the war against cruelty. 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Our Canadian Question And Answer Corner

Q .- What did Canada's fisheries ield in 1921?

A .- The rield of Canada's fisheries in 1921 was \$34,930,935, compared with \$49,241,339 in 1920, a decrease of 29 per cent. owing chiefly to lower prices. The quantity of salmon caught and landed dropped from 1.384,729 hundred-weight in 1920 to 878,124 hundred-weight in 1921 and the total value as marketed in the different forms from \$15,595,970 to \$9,305,763. The catch of lobsters decreased from the previous year by only 6,360 hundred-weight but the decrease in total market value was \$2,000,052. Cod, hallbut, whitefish. mackerel, plokerel, tullibee, perch and ovsters show increases in catch and decreases in market value. Herring, haddock, sardines, policek, bake and cusk and pfichards show decreases in catch as well as in total
