UMPIRES NAMED FOR WORLD'S SERIES

Klem, McCormick, Owens and Hildebrand Appointed by Major League Presidents.

William J. Klem and Barry McCormick, of the National League, and Brick Owens and George Hildebrand, of the American League, will be the umpires in the world's series between the Giants and Yankees.

Some surprise was caused by the failure of President Johnson to name Billy Evans for the big series.

On the other hand, it will be the eleventh series in which Klem has officiated. The National League umpired his first series in 1908.

Harry McCormick, the other National League nominee, has never officiated in the big series. He is the only one of the four who has never seen experience in a world's series.
