Champlain Monument on Dufferin Terrace

To the many artistic monuments to be seen in the city of Quebec, out of which those of Champlain on the Terrace and Mgr. de Laval in front of the Post Office, are not the least, another will soon be added which will be of no ordinary interest, as it will be erected to the memory of one of the greatest personalities in the contemporary history of French Canada. Cardinal Elzéar Alexandre Taschereau, the first Canadian to become member of the Holy College of Rome, will shortly have his statue in his good old Quebec, the city he loved and cared for during his lifetime, and upon which was reflected so much of the glory he gathered by his rapid ascent in the hierarchy of the Catholic Church. Cardinal Taschereau was appointed to that high state in 1886 and he died in 1897. He was succeeded by Mgr. Bégin, who was later awarded the scarlet robes of office.

It had long been the earnest desire of the citizens of Quebec to have the memory of their beloved cardinal recalled in a more material fashion, and for that purpose a public subscription had been organized some time ago to defray the cost of such a memorial. When sufficient funds had been collected, a contest in which many noted sculptors from America and the old world participated, was held, and from the models submitted by these artists, a committee selected the design of the Statue which will later be unveiled on the Place de la Basilique, in front of the famous old temple of Quebec.

Its author is a French sculptor of renown, Mr. André Vermare of Paris, who has been engaged in making many of France's best known monuments erected in recent years. One of them recalling the fame of the "Blue Devils," the celebrated Alpine regiment of France, stands on the summit of Guetwiller and is much admired. Shortly after the decision of the committee was made known, Mr. André Vermare landed in Quebec with Mr. Maxime Roisin, the architect who is going to design the pedestal of the Taschereau memorial. Mr. Roisin, also, has attained a great reputation in his country as a master of his art. His last work of importance is probably the triumphal arch which will soon be built on the road from Bar-le-Duc to Verdun, to immortalize the glorious stand of the "Poilus" on what was then known as the "Hell of Verdun."

The two French artists, who left Quebec for their own country a short time ago to proceed with their work on the Taschereau memorial, took the opportunity of their stay in the old city of Champlain to collect some valuable information regarding the life, ways and character of the late cardinal, such information being indispensable to give a true interpretation of his personality. The location of the monument was also discussed, and it was agreed that it would stand in the little park stretching in front of the Basilica, at the end of the Rue de la Fabrique. While in Quebec, Mr. Vermare and Mr. Roisin were the guests at a great banquet given in their honour at the Garrison Club, at which most of the prominent people of the ancient capital attended. In answer to various speeches of welcome by Hon. L. A. Taschereau, Mgr. Marois, Mr. Herff Gagnon, and others, Mr. Vermare said how he and his companion were pleased to be in Quebec and how they had been impressed by the welcome extended to them. He also had eloquent words to express his admiration for the picturesqueness of the city and for the congenial hospitality of its citizens. He said he hoped to come back for the unveiling of the statue, which will take place on June 17th, 1923.

DEVOTED TO PEACE.

stop them. She said the prime minister was doing his best to that end and had in fact decided to devote the rest of his life to securing of peace among nations.

The David Thompson Memorial



ON the shores of Lake Windermere, British Columbia, there transpired recently an event which will be incorporated in the history of Canada. This was the dedication of a Memorial Fort erected to David Thompson, Canada's greatest geographer and surveyor.

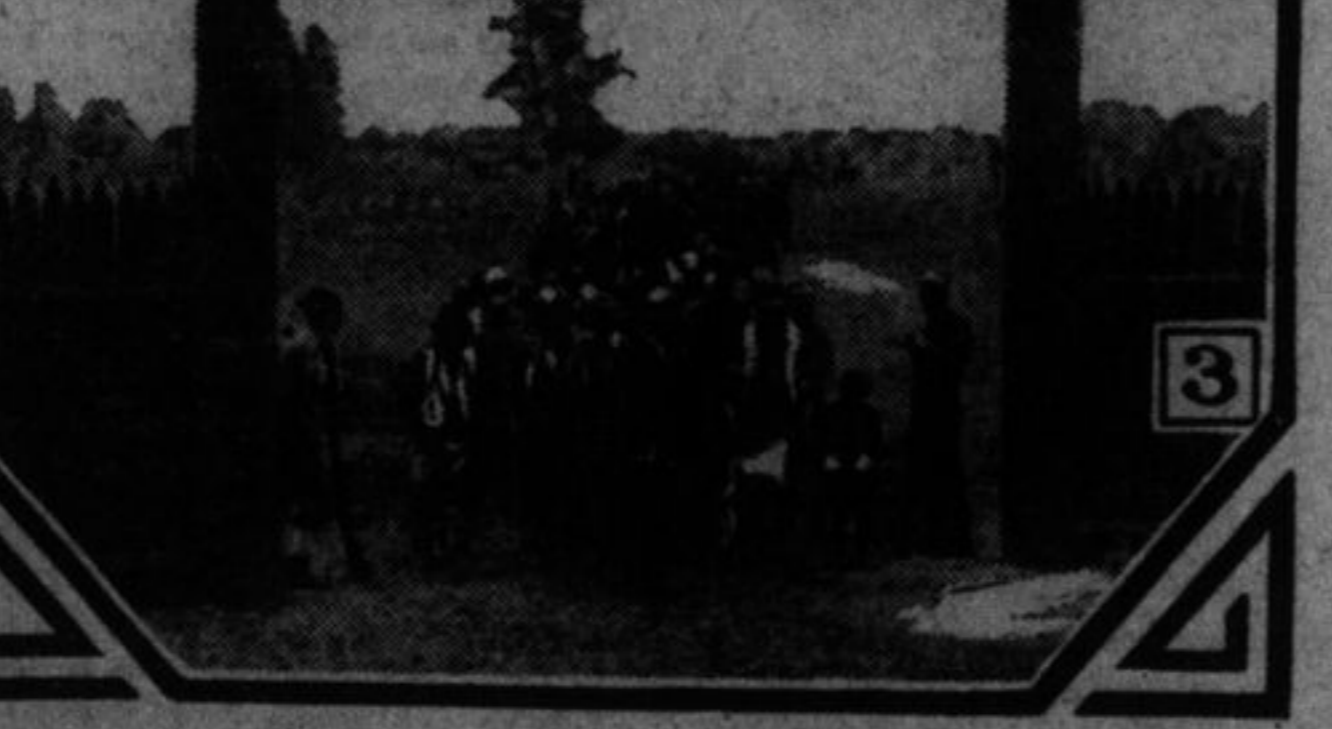
The Fort, which is the largest log building in Canada, was erected by the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Hudson's Bay Company; and it will be used in future as a museum.

With faces painted in the brightest hues, and attired in colorful tribal costumes, Indians from the Kootenay and Shuswap reserves were the principal attraction at this inspiring event. Their teepees were pitched on the top of the hill surrounding the Fort. As dusk fell they lit camp fires and soon the visitors from Eastern and Western Canada and the United States were entertained with music supplied by the tom-tom augmented by the husky voices of the Braves.

The Indians had gathered to do honor to Canada's greatest surveyor who landed on the shore of Lake Windermere in 1807, and for this event they brought with them their finest costumes. Beads in rainbow shades, combined with Elk's teeth and vari-colored feathers were the "materials" used for the attractive garbs of the squaws. Gaily colored shawls and skirts brought to mind that one need not travel to world-famous fashion centres to obtain ideas for daring color schemes. Each child and wee papoose was arrayed in its tribal costumes with beadwork of dazzling beauty. When an Indian tribe packs its teepees and moves it is always accompanied by the "Medicine Man." He is regarded by his fellowmen as gifted with rare talents. The "Medicine Man" of the Kootenay tribe was, perhaps, the most picturesque figure of the pageant.

His costume was most colorful and his headdress was unique. Both tribes entered into the spirit of the event with keen interest and

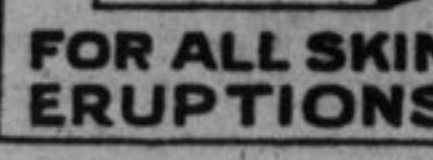
were responsible for the pageant here, again, members of the Kootenay and Shuswap carried off prizes which they captured in almost every case, with little effort.

HINCHINBROOKE.

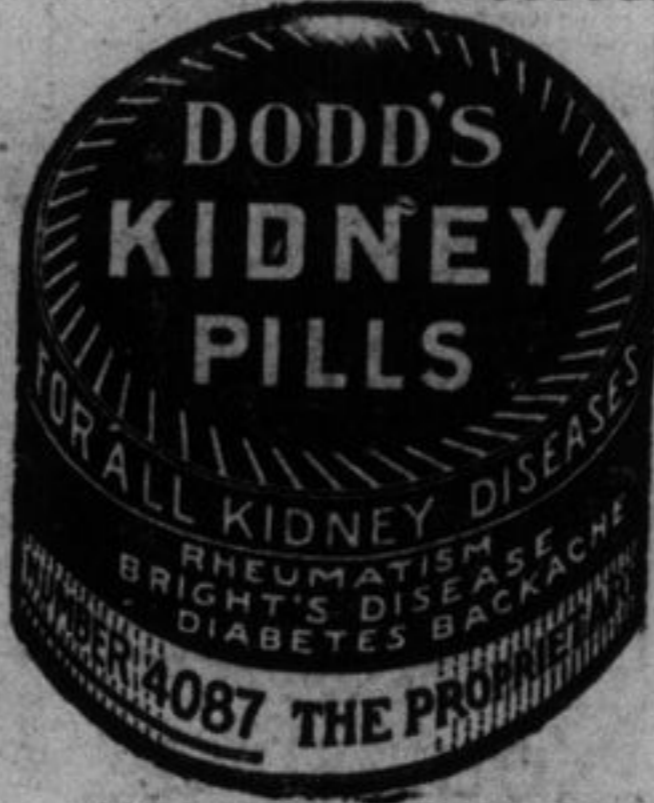
