## STAGE ALL SET FOR BIG MATCH

The Hamilton outfit is very anxious to make a good showing against George Awrey's stalwarts and will bring a strong dozen for the battle. Up in Hamilton they follow the news of the Queen's squad with great interest and they have picked the tricolor to cop the title this year and therefore think that a close game between these teams would mean a feather in the cap of each.

Queen's have been practising steadily for the event and will be all ready for the friendly invaders. It will be their first appearance against a senior outfit this year and the seat sale was about swamped at the time of going to press. Indications are that the large additional accommodation provided by the reconstruction of the bleachers will be all utilized.

## PETER MANNING REDUCES RECORD

### Tommy Murphy Drives Great Trotter Mile in 1.56 3-4.

At Lexington, Ky., Irving Gleason's Peter Manning, driven by Thomas W. Murphy, lowered the world's record for trotters to 1.56 3-4 on Wednesday, beating his own record of 1.57 at the recent Columbus meeting. W. B. Dickerson's Nedda, driven by Harry Fleming, lowered the record for trotting mares to 1.58 1-4, meeting the record of Lou Dillon, made at Memphis nine-teen years ago.

Peter Manning trotted the first quarter in .30, the half in .58 1-2, the three-quarters in 1.27 1-2 and finished the mile in 1.56 3-4. Nedda's fractional time was .29 1-2, .58 3-4, 1.28 and 1.58 1-8.

## "BIG SIX" TO ATTEND WORLD SERIES GAMES

Idol of New York fandom for more than a decade and hero of one of the greatest world's series triumphs in history, Christy Mathewson will return to witness the battles between the Yankees and Giants.
