PUBLIC MEETING CALLED TO AID FIRE SUFFERERS

Mayor Corbett to Preside at Gathering in Memorial Hall Tuesday Evening.

Mayor Corbett has called a public meeting in the memorial hall, city buildings, for Tuesday evening at eight o'clock in response to appeals from Toronto for help for the Northern Ontario fire sufferers. The need is urgent, particularly for clothing, bedding, etc. Already organizations throughout the province are at work on relief. Kingston's Red Cross society and women's church organizations have responded to the call, and collections have already been given by various churches. What is required is to organize all the local workers. This is largely what the meeting in the memorial hall is for. Mayor Corbett will preside, and the needs of the stricken people of our own northland will be laid before the gathering. Everyone interested is asked to attend this meeting.

REV. J. O. WATTS SUFFERED

The Members of Chalmers Church Have Sent Him Financial Assistance.

Rev. J. O. Watts, a former member of Queen's University staff, who also conducted services in the First Congregational church for some time and taught a men's bible class at Chalmers church, has been minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, Halleybury, for some time, and according to reports from that place, his church was burned in the big fire and although nothing official has been received, it is believed that the parsonage was also destroyed. Prof. Watts and his family had a close call, some of the members of the family having to stay in the water of the lake all night. At Chalmers church on Sunday morning, Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson referred to the sad plight of Prof. Watts and his family, and his suggestion that a collection be taken up on his behalf met with a liberal response, and as a result a goodly sum will be despatched to Mr. Watts, as it is understood that he and the members of his family lost everything they possessed in the catastrophe. "You may be sure that if Prof. Watts does not need the money, it will be used to a good purpose in relieving the suffering," said Dr. Wilson, who also paid a warm tribute to the work of Prof. Watts at the First Congregational church, and also at Chalmers church, stating that it was his love to preach the gospel had caused him to leave his college work and take up the work of the ministry.

WOMAN TIRED OF LIFE SUICIDES WITH POISON

Self-Inflicted Cuts Indicate She Wished to Make Death Doubly Sure.

Mrs. Agnes Johnson, aged twenty-eight, died Friday morning at her home on a farm on the Morristown road, out of Ogdensburg, N.Y., from the effects of poison taken Monday. Coroner C. C. Bartholomew, who investigated the case, gave a verdict of death by suicide.

When Mrs. Johnson's husband returned home Monday night from the Sheffield Farms' milk plant, where he is employed, he found the door of the farmhouse locked. Forcing it open, he discovered his wife in apparent agony. It is stated that on her body indicated that she had attempted to sever the jugular vein and a wrist artery after taking the poison. At this time, Mrs. Johnson is alleged to have said, "I am tired of life."

Dr. H. S. Stilwell was immediately summoned by the woman's husband, but from the beginning there was no hope of saving her life. It is understood that Mrs. Johnson came here some years ago from Kingston, Ont.

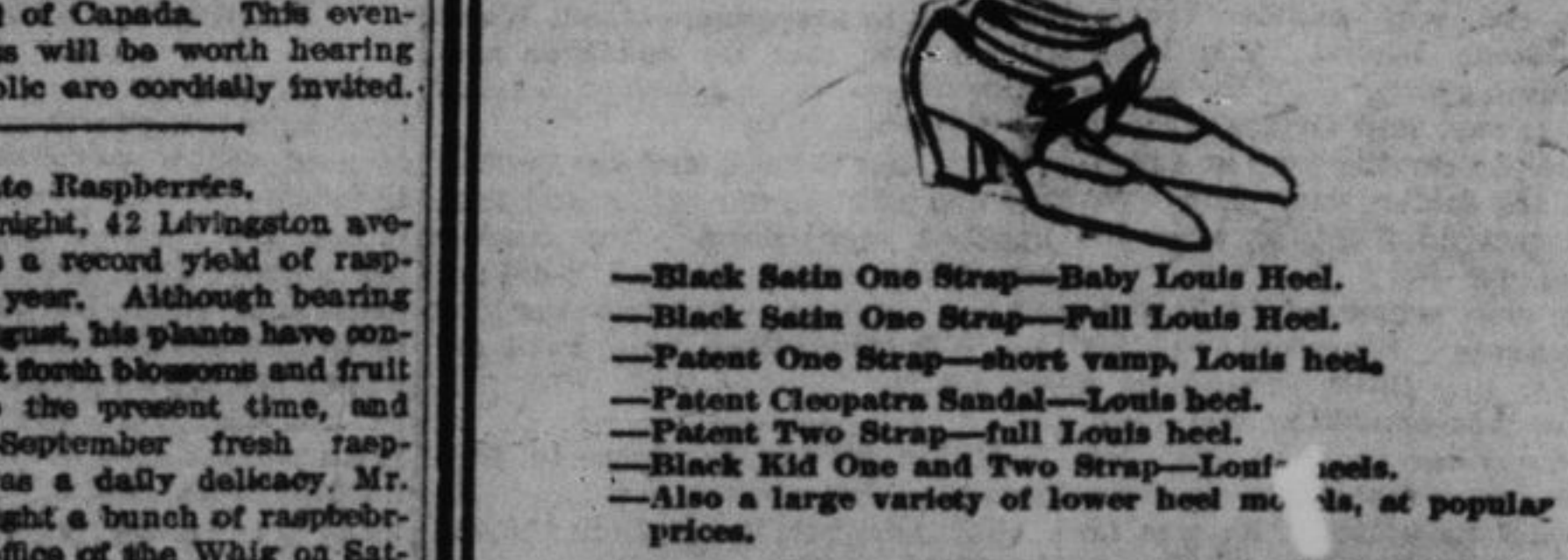
