

the following: "It will be news to most people that the head of an important educational institution in Smyrna, which was the ecene of recent outrages by the Turks, including the destruction of a large part of the city by fire. Is a Canadian. This is Dr. Alexander MacLachian, President of the Inernational College, a native of Ontarto, who graduated from Queen's

University, Kingston, in 1884. "Although now 70 years old, Dr. MacLiachian has taken an active part in the defense of Armenians and Americans in the rent troubles, and has been mentioned in messages to recent British papers. The London Dadly Telegraph of September 14th says in a meseage from Smyrna: "Dr. MacLachian, head of the International College, was attacked and 'severely beaten yesterday by a band of 20 brigands, who took all his money and valuables. His wounds are not serious." "Dr. MacLachlan, following his graduation at Queen's, attended the Union Theological Seminary, New ribbon bows tied around their ankles York. The International College is the outgrowth of a boys' school begun in 1891 by Dr. MacLachlan. In the course of its evolution it became a college, with its present name, in 1903, and its trustees legally incorporated in the United States.

"In spite of the very abnormal conditions subsequent upon continued warfare in Asia Minor since 1904, the college was able to maintain its work without interruption, and, in addition, it assisted very materially in relief activities during the war and after the armistice. For many years the college observatory supplied the city of Smyrna with standard time; until the outbreak of the war daily bulletins were prepared and sent to the Meteorological Offices in London and Washington."
