SHAGMEN PRACTICE SOON AFTER MATCH

Right at It Again on Monday in Preparation for Queen's.

The majority of the McGill players who took part in the opening match of the Intercollegiate season against Varsity at Toronto on Saturday afternoon were on hand for the light signal practice against the intermediate squad at the stadium on Monday. Philipotts, Crain and Robertson were obliged to leave off practice work on account of injuries received in Saturday's game. Philipotts is still under observation in case of internal injury. He was badly shaken during the play, but it is expected that a short rest from heavy work will put him in shape for the game here. Saturday against Queen's. Crain is out with an injured foot, while Robertson is suffering from a sore groin, but both players will be in trim for practice work today or tomorrow.

Coach Shaughnessy made a few changes in his line-up of the senior team during the practice yesterday. SYBIL BAUER BREAKS MEN'S SWIM RECORD

Chicago Girl First to Set Swim Mark Faster Than Man's Best.

In the swimming meet held at St. George in which American and Bermuda women swimmers participated, the 150-yard free style event was

won by Gertrude Ederle of the Women's Swimming Association of New York in one minute, forty-five seconds. This time is said to have broken the former world records of one minute 49 3-5 seconds, held by Charlotte Boyle Clune of New York, and 1:48, held by Hilda James, of England.

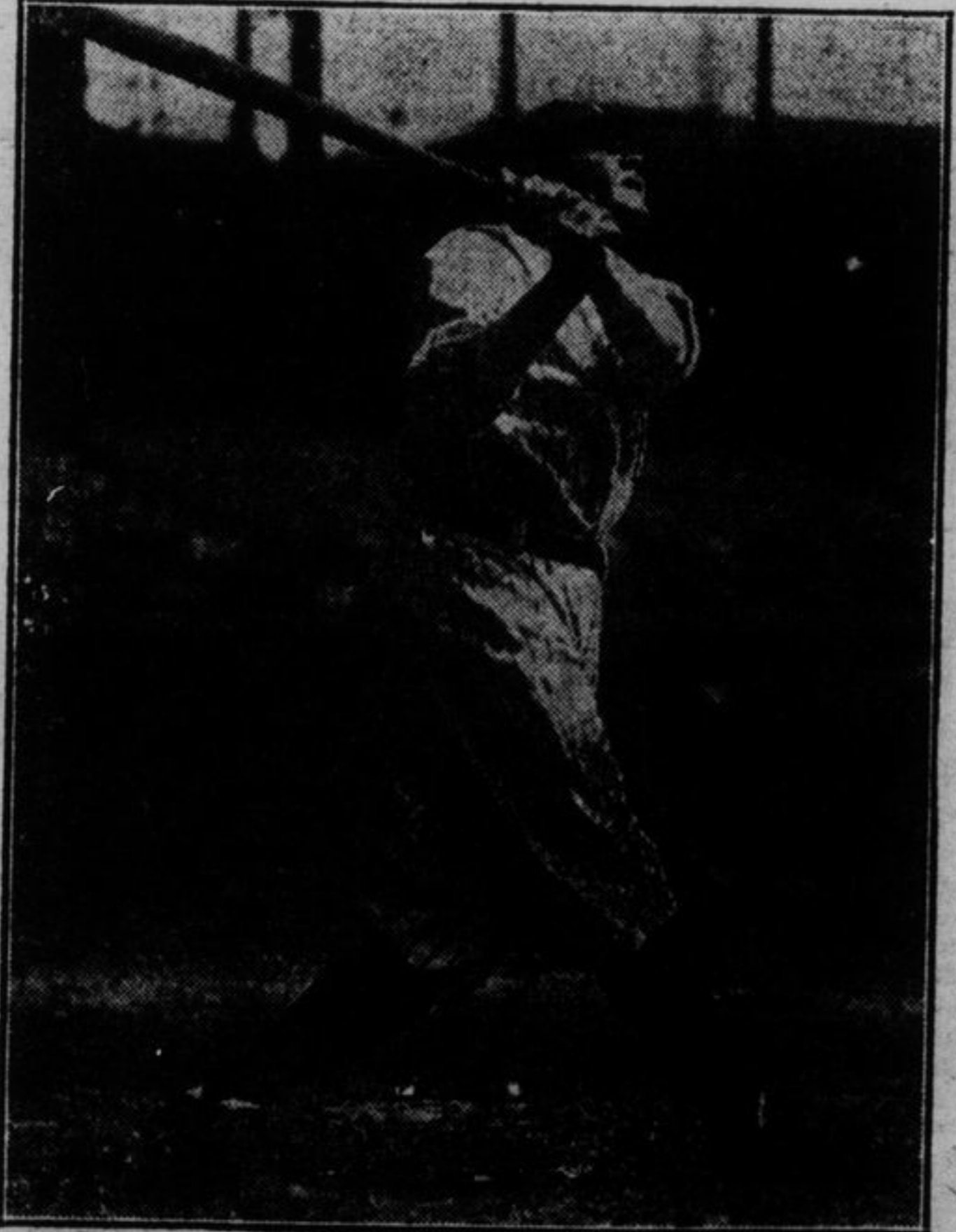
To Return the Visit.

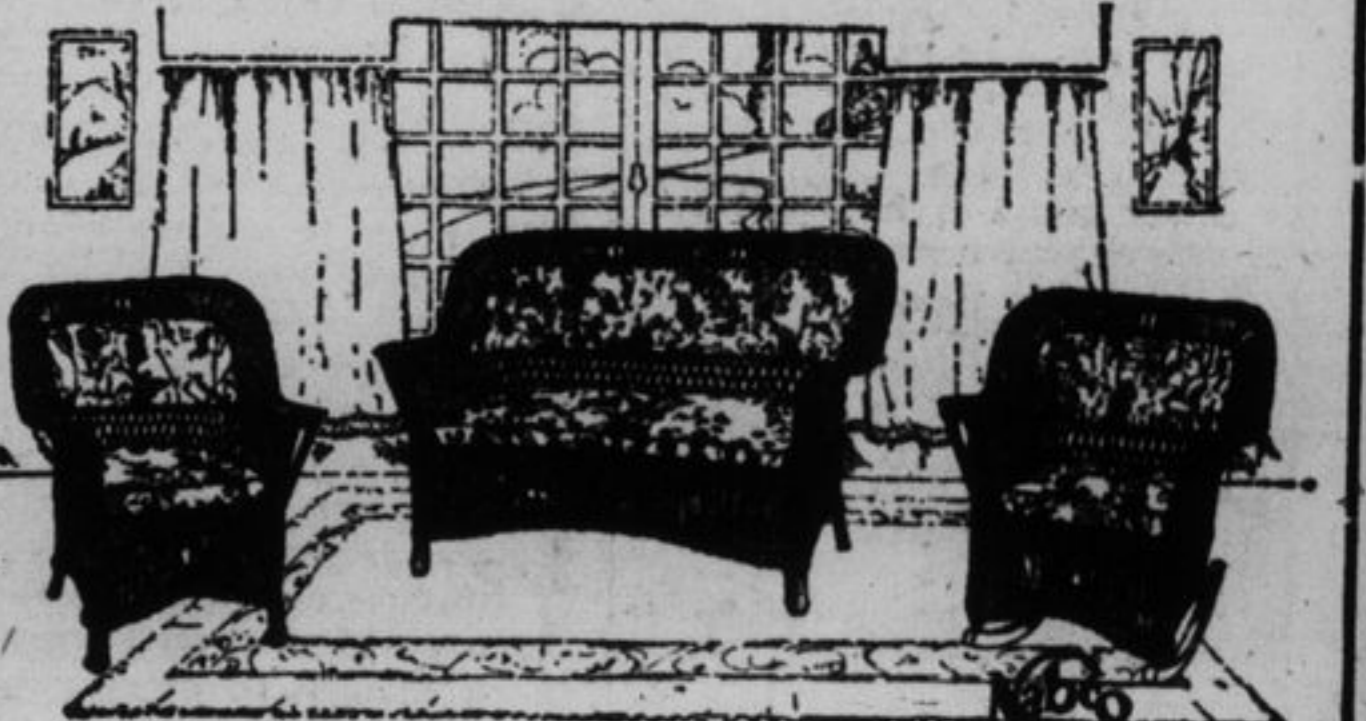
