### MAKES STRONG APPEAL FOR FIRE PREVENTION

#### Big Fire Losses Due Largely to Carelessness Says Chief Armstrong.

That every citizen should do his or her share in the interests of fire prevention, was the keynote of a splendid address given to the members of the Kingston Rotary Club, at their noon-day luncheon on Friday, in the British-American hotel by Fire Chief James Armstrong.

The address was listened to with very keen interest by the members, and coming as it did during "Fire Prevention Week," it was indeed most timely.

In his opening remarks, Chief Armstrong stated that fire prevention was at the present time occupying foremost attention of the fire departments all over the province.

Chief Armstrong drew attention to the fact that last year, in Canada, the loss through fires amounted to \$45,500,000. There were 27,600 fires, and these figures did not include forest fires. There had been paid in insurance, the sum of \$65,000,000 and the sum of \$2,000,000 for fire protection, making a total of \$132,500,000.

Chief Armstrong remarked that already he had in the neighborhood of \$150,000 loss in fires in his book for this year, which had every indication of being the highest on record, in the history of the city for fire loss.

Another very important matter referred to by the fire chief, had to do with a clean-up campaign.

The speaker also emphasized the fact that at the present time, Kingston only had sufficient fire protection to cope with small fires, and remarked that up till the present time, kind Providence had favored the city.

In his closing remarks, Chief Armstrong said that he hoped he would secure the assistance of the club in his fire prevention work.
