### THE I.O.D.E. VISITORS GUESTS AT THE R.M.C.

Presented Picture to the Commandant—Delighted With What They Witnessed.

At two o'clock on Friday afternoon the cars of the Rotary Club lined up outside the south entrance to Grant Hall to take the members of the I.O.D.E. convention to the Royal Military College to accept the invitation of the Commandant to see the beauties and interests of Point Frederick. Past the Tete-du-Pont barracks so interesting to those whose homes are not in garrison cities, across La Salle Causeway, and along the driveway to the college, catching a glimpse of the blue waters of Lake Ontario dancing in the October sunshine, the visitors arrived at the stables where from a gallery they watched the first class cadets ride under the command of Capt. Bray. Loud were the exclamations of those who had never witnessed the horsemanship of the lads of R.M.C., and the half hour allotted to this part of their entertainment seemed all too short. The gymnasium was visited to see an exhibition of physical training and gymnastics by the third class. Capt. Harvey in command and then the visitors went out to the square where an exhibition of arm drill and infantry drill was given by the second class.

Point Frederick's ramparts were next visited, where a glorious view of lake and river met the eye, and here marching along under the lee of the ramparts, their pipes skirling gaily, came the college pipers, all returned men. The old Fort built in 1846 was next visited, and the guests saw the relics of the late war gathered in the trenches, the old canon of a by-gone age, ovens, short shooters', rooms, and were each given a grape shot made for the old guns, as a souvenir of this delightful afternoon. The artillery building was visited, and then the party gathered in Sir Arthur Currie Hall where the cadets lined up along the walls. The president, Mrs.

Burkholder, and most of the executive, were on the platform with Major-General Sir Archibald Macdonell and Brig-General A. E. Ross, M.P. The commandant welcomed the I.O.D.E. to the college, saying it was a peculiar pleasure as their ideas and doctrines were those for which the Royal Military College stood—Canadianism free from all snobbery. R.M.C. was the only national college of Canada. It had a four years' course, but was a civil as well as a military institution, 90 per cent. of its graduates entering civil life. The war was the testing time. A thousand sons of the college were ready to go, a thousand went. Mrs. Burkholder then on the behalf of the Provincial Chapter I.O.D.E., presented the Commandant, staff and gentlemen cadets of the Royal Military College with a picture, one of those issued by their educational department, "The Death of General Wolfe," saying how much the chapter appreciated the hospitality shown them. General Macdonell accepted the picture in the name of all ranks, saying General Wolfe first planted the Union Jack on Canadian soil and he hoped what they had seen that afternoon would convince them that the lads of the R.M.C. would never let it fall.

The cadets sang a verse of "We'll Never Let the Old Flag Fall" and then General Ross spoke briefly, referring to Canada's traditions and the glorious example of the heroes of the Empire, who have won for us what we know as civilization.

After singing O Canada and the National Anthem, the party adjourned to the officers' mess room, where tea awaited them and where many of the visitors had the pleasure of being presented to Sir Archibald and Lady Macdonell.

Upon returning to the city, the party went to Memorial Hall where ex-Mayor H. C. Nockle showed them the fine hall with its roll of honor of the men of Kingston who fell in the Great War, and then turning on the lights of the memorial windows, explained their meaning to the visitors, who regarded this as a most interesting ending to a delightful afternoon.

### WITH CLOSE ATTENTION AND WITH INTEREST

A Body of Teachers Heard Prof. J. F. Macdonald Discuss Poetry.

The members of the South Frontenac Teachers' Institute were the guests of the Prince Edward County Teachers' Convention in Grant Hall on Friday afternoon when the latter association arrived in the city on an excursion from Pooton, arranged as part of their annual meeting. An address by Prof. J. F. Macdonald, Queen's University featured the afternoon programme in the historic hall, while various routine reports were also heard from the visiting delegates.

Prof. Macdonald's address was an instructive review of "Good and Bad Poetry," and his remarks were listened to with very close attention and interest by the assembled teachers. He sketched the history of poetry from the old English period until the present day, and compared the works of various poets, some famous, some obscure, in our own and other ages. Some sound advice regarding the reading of poetry was also given by the speaker at the conclusion of his address.

Miss Helena Burns, a delegate from the Prince Edward Institute to Northern Ontario, gave an interesting report of her trip, corresponding to the report read by Mr. Coe-grove at the South Frontenac convention. A picture of great interest to the teachers was given by Donald Crawford, his subject being the "Teaching of Physical Geography."

Upon their arrival in the city, via the steamer Brockville, the excursionists were met by members of the South Frontenac Institute, and shown the principal points of interest in the city, later being escorted to the University. There they were met by Principal R. Bruce Taylor, who welcomed them on behalf of Queen's. The party left the city at 4.30 o'clock in the afternoon after expressing great pleasure with their trip and the courtesy and friendship of their friends in Kingston.

The officers of both institutes stated that their conventions this year had been exceptionally successful, and with a record attendance. The Inspectors of public schools in the counties S. A. Truscott and F. P. Smith were interested guests during the proceedings of the two conventions, and were on the platform at the Grant Hall meeting. The 1922 officers of Prince Edward County Institute are: President, Miss E. Dunkley; secretary, Miss Mary Dunkey; treasurer, Miss Margaret Manely; and member of executive committee, Mrs. M. Goodwin.

### Local Preachers' Qualifications.

Toronto, Oct. 14.—"I strongly hold that there should be a thorough examination which must be passed before any local preacher receives a license," declared Rev. Dr. S. M. Sanford, New Westminster, B.C., yesterday, when the Methodist General Conference continued its discussion on the report of the course of study committee. Dr. J. B. Bowes, president of the Toronto conference, said that if examinations were enforced it would mean the elimination of local preachers. Dr. Salem Bland, Toronto, was not in favor of making it harder for men to enter the work and he would not impose an examination upon them.
