Two No-hit Games Pitched During the 1922 Season

Two no-hit games, the seventh and eighth in the history of the major leagues, were the pitching features in 1922 baseball, a season marked by heavy hitting, according to semi-official figures. Charlie Robertson of the Chicago Americans, sprang from a rookie's lowly estate to baseball fame, by turning back the Detroit Tigers without a hit on April 30th, and Jess Barnes, the New York Giants' veteran, entered the hall of fame May 7th, a week later, by pitching almost perfect ball against Philadelphia.
