MANY LINES OF FARMING IN PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY

Favor Diversification, But Low Prices Affect Both Growers and Canning Factories—Men With Small Outlay Have Done Best—Conditions Adverse for Dairymen.

Farmers' Sun, Toronto. Prince Edward is the county of diversified farming. In no other district in the province has diversification in agricultural production been carried so far.

But it is as a producer of canning crops, and as a centre of the canning industry, that this county is best known. Canning factories dot the landscape down there as those little water-wheel saw mills dotted the lake front counties in pioneer days.

Notwithstanding the diversity in production, and volume of output, neither factory owners nor farmers are feeling in a particularly happy frame of mind at the present time. This is because prices are low alike for the finished product of the farm and the finished output of the factory.

Low Prices for Truck Crops. These, however, were quite exceptional cases. The price paid for green peas ranged from \$120 per ton for No. 1 to \$30 for No. 4, and over 50 per cent. of the crop, Mr. Hyatt said, graded No. 4.

For tomatoes the contract price was 35c per bushel, but dockage for off quality brought the price actually paid nearer 25c. While the season was exceptionally favorable for tomatoes in the county in one respect it was decidedly unfavorable in another.

In some of the more common lines of agriculture returns are still worse. Patrons of cheese factories have been fairly hard hit by a combination of unfavorable circumstances. Owing to last year's feed shortage hay went up to \$30 per ton during the winter and the rations of cattle were skimmed.

After-Effect of Inflation. Back of all is the fact that, in some cases at least, people appear to have imagined that the war prices prevailing during 1916-19 represented a normal condition, and to have acted accordingly. Spending, both public and private, seems in not a few instances to have been based on that belief.

At Madoc on Thursday some 400 boxes of cheese were sold at 13 1/2c

est, and two, three and even four years past due. Speaking generally, the most comfortably circumstanced producers appear to be a little group of truckers along the shore of West Lake and with holdings of two to ten acres each.

What have these new-comers done with their former holdings, and what has become of those whose properties they have purchased? In a general way, it appears that in North Hastings, when a farm is sold, a neighbor is the buyer and farm is added to farm.

While Prince Edward, in common with other counties, has been hard hit by poor crops last year and low prices in the present year, no one with a knowledge of the history of the past can entertain any fear as to the future. A county that can bear up under the collapse of the lake fisheries, on which it chiefly depended a couple of generations ago; that was not more than checked in its onward progress by the mildge that destroyed its spring wheat crops at a later period, by the weevil that temporarily ruined its pea industry, or the McKinley tariff, that made a mere memory of "Bay of Quinte barley," is not going to lie down under two adverse seasons.

Saturday's Market. Saturday's market was not characterized by any unusual occurrences. The price trend remained about the same as last Saturday with slight differences up or down balancing each other.

FRENCH SAY MORATORIUM UTTERLY INADMISSIBLE

Queen's and McGill Thought About Equal Montreal, Oct. 14.—Judging from the sale of tickets there will be a large crowd present at the Percival Molson memorial stadium this afternoon when Queen's and McGill meet for the first inter-collegiate rugby game to be played locally this season.

Paris, Oct. 14.—The decision of the French government to instruct its representative on the allied reparations commission to oppose in the commission the latest proposition made by Sir John Bradbury of England, that an immediate moratorium for a period of five years be granted Germany on all cash payments, was reached at a meeting at the French foreign office yesterday, presided over by Premier Poincaré, at which Finance Minister DeLasteurie, Minister of Liberated Regions Reibel, M. Barthou, Eugene Maucier, head of the allied guarantees commission, and M. Seydoux, financial adviser of the foreign office, were present.

Sir John's proposition contained an extensive plan for financial reforms to be established in Germany, necessitating the closest allied control, but, according to the French interpretation, based mainly upon the good-will of the German government. The plan will be studied by the various technical and financial services in the French ministry of finance, insofar as it concerns reforms in the present procedure.
