THE TURKS TO MAKE FOUR NEW DEMANDS

Constantinople, Oct. 17.—The Turkish newspaper, Herd, says Mustafa Kemal Pasha will make four important new demands at the coming peace conference. These will be, first, for the suppression of the Greek navy; second, for the exchange of all persons of the civilian minorities, meaning the return to Turkey of all Moesians in Greek territory and the repatriation of all Greeks in Turkish territory; third, the neutralization of the Aegean Islands, and, fourth, that the question of Western Thraee be decided by a plebiscite.

COAL RUSHED INTO CANADA. Over 50,000 Tons So Far Brought From Oswego. Oswego, N.Y., Oct. 17.—With every available lake craft being pressed into service, a frantic effort is being made to get every pound of coal possible into Canada before close of the season of navigation on Lake Ontario. Since settlement of the miners' strike a month ago, approximately 50,000 tons of anthracite has been sent out from Oswego over the water route. With the exception of a few hundred tons that went to American ports on the St. Lawrence river, shipments were destined for the Canadian market. Bulk of the cargoes has been sent to Toronto, Kingston and Montreal. Some of the smaller ports, such as Belleville, Picton and Gananoque have also received cargoes from this port.
