

COAL RUSHED INTO CANADA.

Over 50,000 Tons So Far Brought

From Oswego. Oswego, N.Y., Oct. 17 .- With every available lake craft being pressed into service, a frantic effort is being made to get every pound of coal possible into Canada before close of the season of navigation on Lake Ontario.


Since settlement of the miners' strike a month ago, approximately 50,000 tons of anthracite has been sent out from Oswego over the water route. With the exception of a few hundred tons that went to American ports on the St. Lawrence river, shipnents were destined for the Canadian market. Bulk of the cargoes has been sent to Toronto, Kingston and Perishing in the North Montreal.
