TO BE FIXED SHORTLY

But Will Not Be Below \$16.50 -Conference With Fuel Controller.

In Toronto on Tuesday afternoon. the city council of Kingston and the local coal dealers were represented efore the Ontario fuel controler, J. A. Ellis, who heard an application from the city that he set the price of coal in Kingston for the winter. The price to be set will not be on cargoes being brought in by vessel this fall but on coal brought in by rail, as much of the supply season of navigation is closed.

The city council was represented by Mayor Corbett and Alds. Laturney and Graham, and the coal dealers by R. Crawford and J. F. Sowards. The arguments of both were heard, and Mr. Ellis said he would give a decision in a week's time. The ccal dealers held that \$17.50 was the best rate they could give Kingston, and produced their figures on costs.

The controller said that the basis of price would be that of Toronto which he had fixed at \$15.50. As it costs one dollar more to bring a ton of doal to Kingston by rail than to Toronto, the price for Kingston could not be under \$16.50. The price for Niagara Falls has been fixed at \$15.50 and Ottawa at \$16.50.
