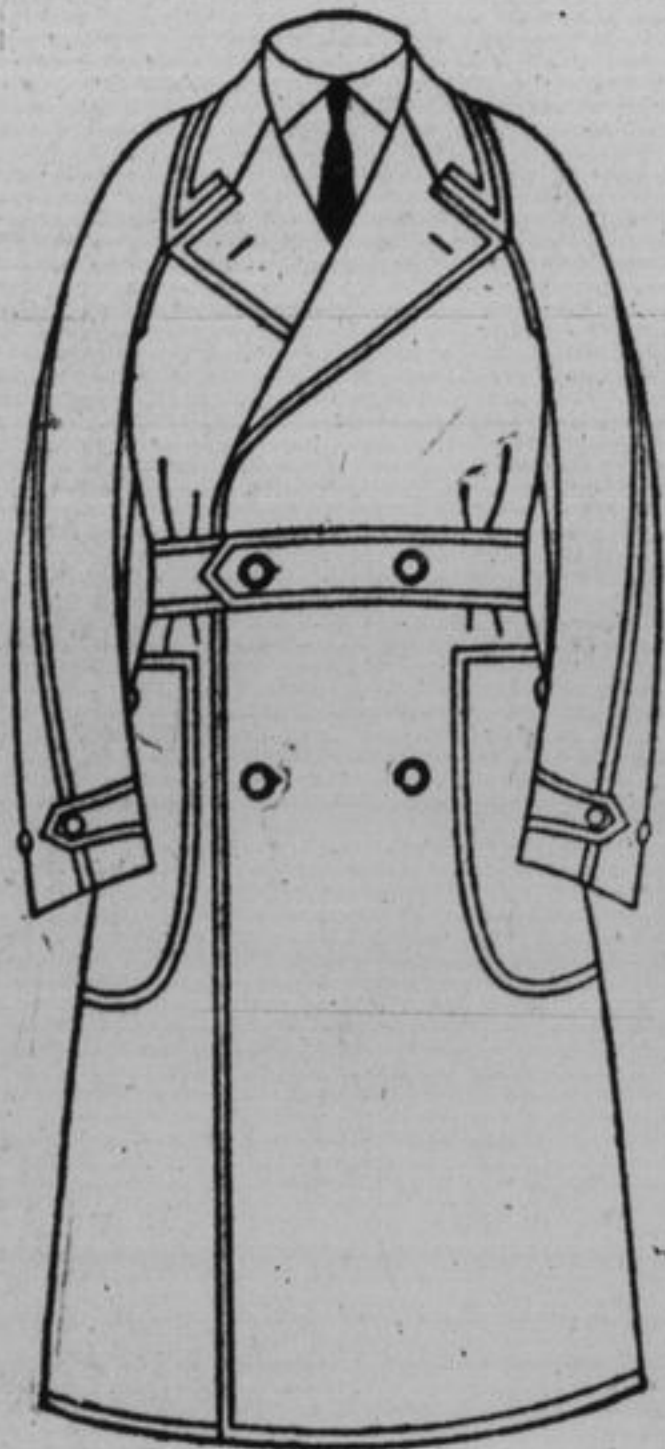

The deceased was seventy-four years of age, but was in remarkably good health, and his death was a shock to his numerous friends and relatives.

Mr. Waddington carried on business on King street nearly all his life, and only his advanced age obliged him to retire about three years ago. He was a member of St. Luke's Anglican church. He never married, but he is survived by two sisters, Miss Sarah, at home, and Mrs. Abbot, Bellingham, Wash., U.S.A.
