MUSIC AS AN AID TO DEMOCRACY

What Governments Have Done for Europe Musically. The rapid development of our country and the speed with which land workers arrived almost to a point of affluence, were the determining factors in preventing the growth of peasantry in this country. In contrast with this, we find that the lack of a universal system of education in most of the European countries was the great determining factor in the development of Continental peasantry. We read much about the marvelous folk music of Russia. If we reflect, we find that this was the result of lack of school education, and it was one of the ways through which the peasantry expressed its social, intellectual and political developments.

The folk music of Germany, perhaps not so inspired as the music of Russia and not so beautiful in its content, was the result of education built

largely around mythological text.

European diplomacy realized at a very early stage that national education would be a large contributing element in solidarity in political unification, and because of this fact did a great deal to encourage music as a national institution. The government-supported opera houses in several Continental countries made the development of music possible, and thereby brought distinction and honor to native sons. This country has not felt the necessity for this, but the not felt the necessity for this, but the time will surely come when our own government will appreciate the fact that there is no greater force in nationalization than a well organized and controlled scheme for educating the populace to the belief that music is an important part of educational and political strength.

Schools cannot be without fruitful result. The full effect, of course, may not be realized for several generations, but it is bound to come, because a love for music is being instilled into the hearts of the citizens of to-morrow. And for that reason the early formation of correct habits will inspire the men and women of come.

REACTANCE.

A steady current in a circuit meets no other hindrance than the resistance of the circuit. It the current changes this is no longer true. If the circuit has inductance the current is opposed by the emf. induced by the variation of the current. If a condenser is present this is constantly charging or discharging as the current changes, and it exerts a controlling influence on the passage of current. If both inducand capacitance are included in the circuit they tend to offset each other in their effects, but usually one or the other exerts a predominating influence. with the result that there is added to the resistance an extra opposition to the current, which is

The more rapid the changes in the current the greater the insequently the greater the inductive reactance. On the contrary, the reactance of a condenser is less the more rapidly the current varies, as can be understood when

charges and discharges of the condenser performed each second the greater the total quantity of electricity which flows around the circuit in that interval, that is, the greater the current. In general the reactance of a radio circuit is very much greater than the resistance.


To calculate the current in a radio circuit, then, it is necessary to know how to calculat the reactance and how to combine it with the resistance in order to determine the total hindrance or 'impedance" to the current. Since the reactance, however, depends upon the way in which the current is varying it is evident that this must be specified definitely ir each case. The problem cannot be solved for all imaginable kinds of variations of the current. Radio currents, however, belong to the general class of alternating currents, and for these the theory is rather simple. In the following articles will be given a brief treatment of those alternating current principles which are essential to an understanding of radio.
