He and his wife and family, consisting of six children escaped, but many of their neighbors were killed and injured as

a result of the raids. Mr. Good states that the men taking part in the raids often came to his place at night and made off with his horses, and the animals when brought back in the morning would e worn out.

One of the most stirring stories Mr. Good has to tell is that of the case of a man and his wife. The raiders visited their home one night. One of the raiders drew a revolver, and pulled the trigger to shoot but for some reason the revolver did not discharge and the raider left the souse, and thus the man and his wife were saved. The couple state that as the man left their home they could distinctly see the figure of an angel in the doorway.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

The steamer George King, from Coneaut, Ohio, with 800 tons of soft coal, is unloading at the Canadian Locomotive Company's wharf. The steamers Ottawa and Hamil-

ton passed up on Thursday. The steamer Brockville came Northport and Belleville with canned goods for the north west on Thursday night, and cleared for Pic-

ton this morning. The schooners St. Louis and Mary Daryeau cleared for Oswego. The steamers Jeska cleared for Sodus and the Brantford for Oswego for hard coal. The schooner J. B

Newlands will clear for Oswego. The steamer Simla passed down. The steamer Bay Usher is at the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company's plant for repairs.

Nineteen steamers were windbound at Port Dalhousie over Wednesday. Soft coal is being shipped from the piers at Toledo, Ohio, at the rate of 30,000 tons per day. All of it is going to the head of the lakès.

Wahcondah Back on Route. The steamer Wahcondah, which was recently brought from overseas by A. B. Mackay & Company of Hamilton, has been sold to Captain J. B. Foote and associates, and is now on her way to Montreal with a cargo of grain from Port Colborne. The boat is one of the best known on the lake trade. Bufit in Glasgow in 1903 for A, B. Mackay & Company, the boat was on the lakes until 1916, when she was taken over for war cervice. The Canada Steamship Lines operated her until recently, when A. B. Mackay & Company brought her back to Canada to help in the grain trade. The Wahcondah is a steel freighter of 2,400 tons, with a capacity of 80,-000 bushels of grain.
