FARM HOUSE IS RUINED BY FIRE

Home and Most of Contents Destroyed; Loss \$1,500—On Meade Farm.

Watertown, N. Y., Times. Fire of undetermined origin that started on the roof of the home of Gardner T. Ball on the Charles Meade farm about three miles from

Watertown, N. Y., on the Theresa road Sunday morning completely destroyed the house and most of the contents with a loss that will aggregate \$2,500, or more.

The farm, which is owned by Charles Meade of Central street, was occupied by Mr. Ball. When the fire started about 10.30, those in the house included Mr. Ball, his wife, Mr. and Mrs. James E. Fox, Mrs. Fox being a niece of Mr. Ball's; Charles Moran, a nephew, and Miss Eleanor Marshend, Kingston, Ont., a guest.

The fire was discovered by a man driving by. He rushed into the house and informed the occupants that the roof was afire. Investigations revealed that the north corner of the roof was ablaze and the flames had already eaten through into the upper part of the house.

The fire gained rapid headway, being fanned by a stiff north breeze. A small amount of furniture from the ground floor rooms was saved, and some clothing, but practically all of the furniture of the upper rooms was destroyed. Mr. Moran was asleep in a second floor room when the fire was discovered. When he was aroused smoke and flames were already making their way into the room he occupied.

The fire department was appealed to for help and Pumper Company No. 2 responded. When the firemen arrived the house was practically burned to the ground. It was impossible for the firemen to do anything because there was no water available. The barns and other buildings did not catch fire because the wind was blowing in the opposite direction.

Mr. Ball was today unable to estimate his loss, but it will aggregate \$500 or more. Three hundred cans of fruit, jars of pickles and ten bushels of potatoes in the cellar were destroyed. A sum of money in Mrs. Ball's purse was also lost. Mr. Ball did not have any insurance on the contents of the house, nor did Mr. Meade have insurance on the building, which is estimated as worth \$1,000 or more.

There was a wood fire in the kitchen stove when the fire started. Mrs. Ball was preparing chickens which she intended to cook for the family dinner. A train passed a few minutes before on the Central tracks but a few yards behind the house and it is thought possible that a spark from the locomotive may have dropped on the roof, starting the fire.

WERE SLAIN ON SPOT WHERE BODIES FOUND

An Analysis of the Soil Has Been Made by Celebrated Chemist.

New Brunswick, N.J., Oct. 19.—The Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills were slain on the spot where their bodies were found. E. E. Squibb, celebrated chemist, declared today after an analysis of the soil.

The chemist, who made the analysis for the authorities, reported he found traces of blood in the earth, which he said would indicate that

the two were killed where they were found.

The throat of Mrs. Mills was not cut until after she had been shot to death, the chemist concluded.

The fact the earth under the apple tree was not saturated with blood led him to this conclusion, he said.
