CHANCE OF RUGBY TIE DISCUSSED IN TORONTO

The Queen's-Varsity Games Will Decide—McGill's Re-arranged Lineup.

The Toronto Telegram says: Frank Saughnessy's McGill crew may finish at the bottom of the inter-collegiate race but many a bottom place team has a mighty kick at times. It is just on that Varsity edge that the Blue and White visit the eastern city on Saturday for the annual clash with McGill. With one victory each, Varsity and McGill are tied for the college title. In the matter of points, Varsity have the edge. But in the matter of moral positions Queen's have a margin because they have disposed of McGill right in Montreal.

And that is just what Varsity must do on Saturday. A defeat at the hands of McGill would just about blast the hopes of Varsity supporters for another title. On actual strength Varsity should win, but "on paper" victories, expected do not always turn that way. McGill may rise to heights not expected and if Varsity contribute a few fumbles and McGill have any luck in recovering these then anything is liable to happen. If Varsity do win, the title will be decided in the two games with Queen's and there is the possibility of a tie at the finish.

McGill's New Plays.

A Montreal despatch says: McGill will present a differently arranged line-up and a new vogue of play when they meet the champion University of Toronto squad here on Saturday afternoon in the final game of the intercollegiate season locally. Coach Frank Saughnessy Wednesday worked out the red and white candidates for a hard two hours, using new plays and a shifted team. The McGill coach feels that he will field a squad that will show a more effective fight than did the team against Queen's.

Flanagan and McGregor are still on the ailing list and it is not expected that either will report on the gridiron before Friday. In the mean-

time Manson has been moved to backfield. The former English Rugby player made an excellent showing against Queen's. The plays that the team ran through were totally different from those used against Queen's.

TO GIVE UP RACING.

Jefferson Davis Cohn, whose colt Dauphin was disqualified after winning the \$50,000 Prix du Conseil Municipal at Longchamps, Paris, France, Sunday, has decided to discontinue his entire thoroughbred holdings. These include a large stable of horses in training, a large number of brood mares, stallions, yearlings and foals.

Although there has been no statement from Cohn, as to his reasons for this sudden decision, it is understood that he is disgusted with the action of the officials in depriving him of a rich prize on what he regards a technicality. The discrepancy in weight did not exceed four ounces, but under the rules the stewards had no alternative. They were forced to disqualify the horse.

Queen's Could Not Form Track Team in Time

The intercollegiate track meet at McGill on Friday will not find Queen's represented. When questioned, the athletic board stated that they were not able to send a team, because the short space of time did not permit of sufficient training and only two promising competitors were in any kind of shape. Under the circumstances, it was not deemed advisable to make up a team.

Ottawa Race Track.

Facing a loss of \$14,000 on the season just passed the Connaught Park Club, of Ottawa, has petitioned the Quebec Government for relief from the intolerable taxation. Their attendance was greater than the year before. If the petition is not granted, racing in Quebec must be discontinued, the directors say.

SEND OFF GIVEN TEAMS BY LANDIS

Judge Points Out Responsibility of Trip; Baseball Will Be Advanced.

Baseball Commissioner Landis, Chicago, in a letter made public, declared that "the institution of baseball will be advanced by your individual and collective performances," to a number of players composing a team en route to the Pacific coast to board a steamer for the Orient. The players expect to sail for Japan Thursday to begin a series of exhibition games.

In wishing the players God-speed the baseball commissioner announced that George Moriarty, umpire of the American league, would serve as the umpire in chief in games played in Japan, Honolulu, Manila and other places.

"While this trip," the letter said, "is not in response to any official invitation from the government of Japan, the circumstances attending the invitation and its acceptance, to a considerable degree, distinguish it from a purely private enterprise and make it representative of American baseball. Consequently, the advisory council has authorized Mr. Moriarty to accompany the party as its representative, as it is keenly interested in having the tour reflect credit upon our national game and its professional players."

"Of course the players appreciate the necessity and importance of maintaining the high standards of play and sportsmanship and of personal conduct on and off the field, which they observe during the regular championship season. The personnel of the party is such that we have the utmost confidence that this will be done."

The players making the tour were selected for their ability on the field and general deportment. They are from a number of major league clubs.

RESULTS OF THURSDAY'S TENNIS TOURNAMENT

Two McGill Players, One Varsity Man and Bud Thomas, Queen's, Winners.

Although playing under far from ideal weather conditions the annual intercollegiate tennis meet progressed through to the semi-finals on the first day, Thursday. A lowering sky, and a cold gusty wind, which had full sweep of the courts at Rockwood end was towards the latter part of the afternoon accompanied by rain, made the play less sensational than it would have been with a higher temperature.

At the end of the second round, two McGill representatives, W. E. Crocker and D. Morrice; S. Larkin of Toronto; and E. Thomas of Queen's remained. These four are grouped in the semi-finals. The progress of the first day was considered satisfactory and the winner should be declared Friday afternoon. Crocker who has already made a name for himself in Quebec meets went through the first round easily but in the second round in Ham of Toronto a more difficult proposition. He was however able to win handsly.

R.M.C. were eliminated early in the day, Queen's defeating two and Varsity and McGill players the other two representatives.

Queen's are pinning their faith on "Bud" Thomas to carry off any honors that may come Queen's way. He won two games Thursday defeating Hunter, R.M.C. in the morning and Lyons, Toronto, after a hard battle, in the afternoon.

The afternoon's game was watched with interest by the Queen's supporters for while the Queen's star took the first set easily Lyons "warmed up" in the last and prolonged the game set to 14 games. Jones and Griffin of Queen's were eliminated in the first round while MacLachlan succumbed in the second.

The semi-finals and finals will be

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close contests for while the games Thursday were good, several of the players did not have to exert themselves to win. It was also difficult for the players to "warm up" on account of the cold weather.
