"The Bat."

Mark this date and place well, at the Grand Opera House on Monday and Tuesday, October 23rd-24th. Miss Talmadge as the duchess reaches the heights of her wonderfully successful career; as the heartless court coquette, she is elusive; as the woman whose true love is doubted and forsaken, she is a most magnetic, appealing figure. General de Montriveau, masterfully portrayed by Conway Tearle, kidnaps the duchess, believing her professed love to be a mockery, and in his rage prepares to brand her as a woman to be shunned. But he cannot bring himself to mar her beauty. He frees her. She writes him daily, but her letters are returned unopened. In despair she decides to quit the world forever and go into the seclusion of a convent. De Montriveau learns her love is genuine and arrives at the convent just as she was about to take her final vows that would have closed its walls about her for life. The happy reunion of the lovers is an exquisite finish to this production.

Dorothy Dalton Liked.

Yesterday's audience at the Strand theatre pronounced Dorothy Dalton's latest Paramount picture, "The Siren Call" one well worthy of that young and popular star. The story of the Yukon, its great frozen wastes and its dance halls is stirring indeed. "The Leather Pushers" is getting better every week and "The Adventures of Robinson Crusoe" is growing more popular every day. KINGSTON SHRINERS LEAVE FOR BROCKVILLE

Have Their Own Goat, Bag Pipe Band and Shout for Ceremonial.

Rameses Temple, Toronto, of the Ancient and Arabic Order of nobles of the Mystic Shrine, passed through at the outer station of the Grand Trunk on Friday afternoon, in a special train, on a pilgrimage to Brockville, where they will pitch their tents for a fall ceremonial. They were accompanied by their famous patrol and Shrine band.

The Kingston Shrine Club of Rameses Temple, composed of upwards of fifty members, assembled at the Masonic Temple at 11.45 A.M. and marched to the city station, where a special car awaited them and conveyed them to the outer station, where they departed on the 12.47 train for Brockville. On the train were the members of the Belleville Shrine Club, including a number from that celebrated place known as Corbyville.

The Kingston Shriners, wearing the Oriental fez, the head dress of the order, were bedecked in club streamers, with Kingston Shrine banners, and accompanying them was a bag-pipe band and their own goat named Mohammed the Thirteenth, led by a celebrated Sheikh of the desert, imported from Arabia.

The officers of the club are Capt. Gimlett, president; Harvey Milne, vice-president; Frank Purdy, secretary; Harold Davis, treasurer.

Capt. Fred Vokes, the potentate's aid and representative in Kingston, spent the forenoon purchasing rope for the class of candidates he had in charge to hang on to.
