CONVOCATION AT QUEEN'S EAT AND GET THIN

Ex-Principal Gordon Unveiled Tablet in Memory of Late G. Y. Chown.

The Queen's autumn convocation held in Grant hall Friday evening was marked by several interesting features. Among these was the unveiling of a memorial tablet to the late G. Y. Chown; the unveiling of an oil painting of Hamilton Cassella, the recently retired chairman of the board of governors of the university; and the presentation of a unique volume of philosophical essays to Prof. John Watson as an appreciation of his fifty years of service on the staff of the university.

There was a good attendance at the convocation which was opened by Rev. T. W. Savary, with prayer. In the absence of the chancellor, E. W. Beatty, Principal R. Bruce Taylor, who is also the vice chancellor, presided. Principal Emeritus Dr. D. M. Gordon, the principal emeritus of Queen's unveiled the memorial tablet and the painting, which will be added to the treasures of Convocation hall. He sketched the career of Mr. Cassella and remarked that the painting will be a reminder of the service he has rendered to the university. Dr. Gordon also feelingly referred to the life and work of the late G. Y. Chown in whose memory the memorial bronze is being erected.

Dr. S. W. Dyde, principal of Queen's Theological College, in an excellent address spoke of the fifty years of teaching service rendered by Dr. John Watson. The speaker referred to Dr. Watson as one who in schools and colleges the world over has been recognized as an authority on philosophical study. On behalf of the university he presented Dr. Watson with a unique volume of essays written by teachers of philosophy. The book is the first of the publications of the faculty of arts and contains eleven essays by men of note in the world of philosophy. Dr. Watson fittingly replied and in the course of remarks stated that he had served under four principals. Principal Taylor in adding his word of appreciation said that nothing they could do would sufficiently recognize what John Watson has done for Queen's.

The honorary degree of LL.D. was presented to W. H. Coverdale. Dean O. D. Skelton presented Mr. Coverdale, in a brief address sketching his career, and the recipient made an eloquent and humorous reply. In the course of his reply he remarked that with the opening of the Welland canal Kingston would greatly benefit and briefly spoke of the St. Lawrence canalization scheme reminding his audience of tremendous cost of the undertaking and advising the careful consideration of the consequences resulting from it.

About fifteen students received degrees these having secured their standing through study in the summer school and extra mural courses. The award of scholarships was also made.

Gananoque-Clayton Ferry.

Gananoque, Oct. 21.—Negotiations are being carried on between Capt. W. J. Kenney, who has conducted the Gananoque-Clayton ferry business for the past twelve years, operating a boat in the freight and passenger service as well as the local mail service during the summer season, and the Rockport Navigation Company, who ran an opposition boat on the route this season. The latter company is now endeavoring to purchase from Captain Kenney his rights and privileges to the route. Captain Kenney is in Kingston in conference with the members of the company as to terms of the deal. If the deal goes through Captain Kenney may keep the Yennack and place her on another route.

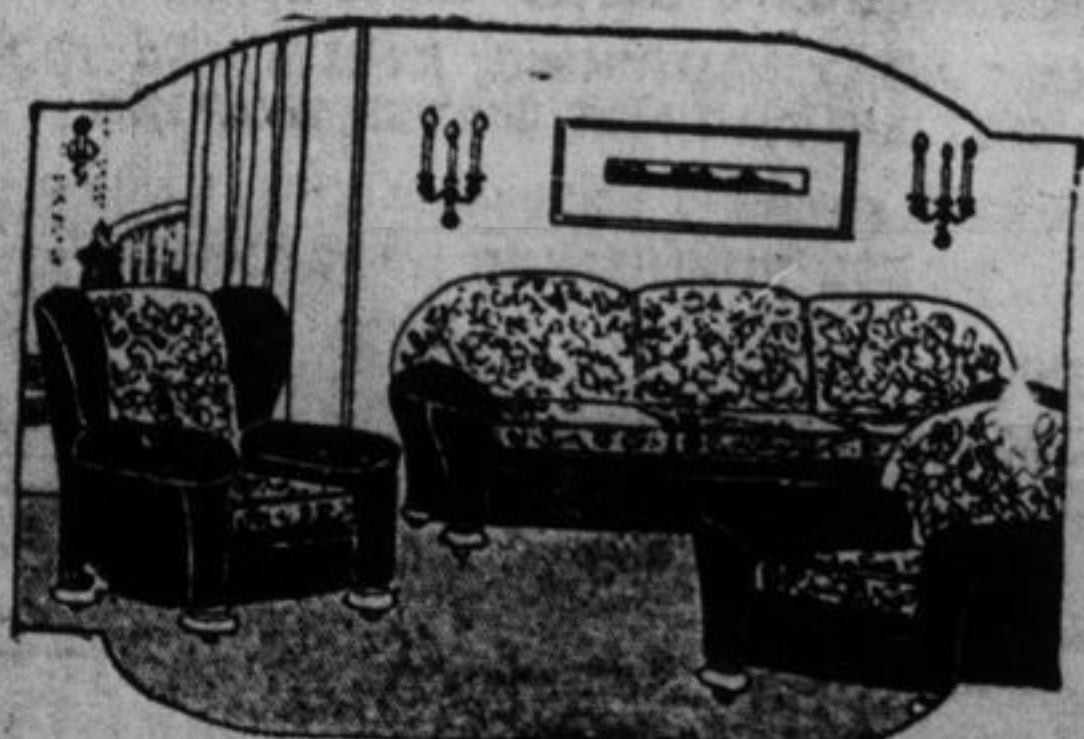
