Gloucester, Mass., Oct. 23.—Order came out of chaos here today after a night of rumors and doubt, and the Henry Ford, challenger for the championship of the North Atlantic fishing fleet, met the schooner Bluenose in the first race of the international series. Following Saturday's contest, which was declared "no race," Captain Clayton Morrissey and the crew of the Henry Ford announced they were through with the race. It was not until an hour before the scheduled starting time today that the Gloucester skipper changed his mind and made ready to meet the defender.

#### LATE DR. LYMAN ABBOTT.

The Eminent Editor of the New York Outlook.  
New York, Oct. 23.—Dr. Lyman Abbott died yesterday at his home in this city.

Rev. Dr. Lyman Abbott, militant Christian, editor and successor to Rev. Henry Ward Beecher, was born at Roxbury, Mass., Dec. 18th, 1835. With his accession, in 1888, to the pulpit of Plymouth church, Brooklyn, formerly occupied by Henry Ward Beecher, he entered literary work, becoming editor of the literary department of Harper's Magazine. At the same time he was associate editor with Dr. Beecher in the publication of the Christian Union, and also edited the Illustrated Christian Weekly.

But it was as editor of the Outlook, a position he undertook in 1893 and held until he died, that he was best known. Here it was that he made his power felt through his pen, although he was a prolific writer of books and contributed to other journals.

Johnson, Progressive member for Moose Jaw, Sask., who was unseated in the recent judgment of King's Bench for corrupt practices in the last general elections.

#### W. G. Kidd in Hospital.

William G. Kidd, Barris street, for many years inspector of the city schools, was on Sunday removed to the General Hospital by James Reid's motor ambulance. Mr. Kidd has enjoyed remarkable health for a man of his advanced age, and his many friends hope for a speedy restoration to health.
