CHALMERS HALL REOPENED

It is One of the Finest Equipped in the Province.

On Wednesday evening, the formal opening of Chalmers Presbyterian church's new Sunday school hall took place and a large number of the congregation availed themselves of the privilege of viewing one of the finest religious school buildings in the province. Everything about the place is of the most modern kind, \$15,000 was expended in remodeling the interior of the building. Owing to the great height of the original hall, the church management was able to divide it without raising the roof, and twelve classrooms are located in the upstairs portion, while the assembly hall is on the ground floor as before. The most modern ventilation system has also been introduced. Everything about the building is of the most chaste kind. Hewitt Newlands and Son were the architects, and their plans were admirable. Thomas Hewitt, a member of the church acted as honorary clerk of works, and reports that every bit of the work is splendidly done.

After the congregation had inspected the building, Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson took the chair and referred to the splendidly equipped building which was to be handed over to the Sunday school superintendent and teachers for the instruction of the young. He called upon Rev. Dr. Macgillivray, the veteran pastor emeritus of Chalmers, whose dream of a building such as this has been realized at last. Dr. Macgillivray offered the invocatory prayer, and then Dr. Wilson called upon Thomas H. Stewart, chairman of the building committee to speak. An address was also given by J. R. Henderson, chairman of the First Congregational board of trustees, whose people now worship with Chalmers. The First Congregational people contributed a portion of the cost of the reconstructed hall. Addresses were also given by Prof. John Matheson, who has been acting as superintendent of the school, D. McDougall, the new superintendent, and W. H. Dyde, secretary-treasurer of the school, who has been connected with it continuously for thirty-five years. Mr. Dyde's mother, Mrs. S. Dyde, a member of Chalmers, was in attendance. She is in her ninety-fourth year.

The musical part of the programme consisted of solos by Miss Waldron, the Misses Anna and Florence Mitchell, Miss Kathleen Elliott and Daniel Couper, the latter a Chalmers chorister, for over thirty-five years. Mrs. Dobbs acted as accompanist. Afterwards, refreshments were served by the ladies of the congregation.

Dr. Wilson announced that the hall would be dedicated on Sunday afternoon next.

The city treasurer has prepared for the city council the following statement regarding the cost of the fair grounds to January 1st, 1918, with interest at the rate of five per cent:

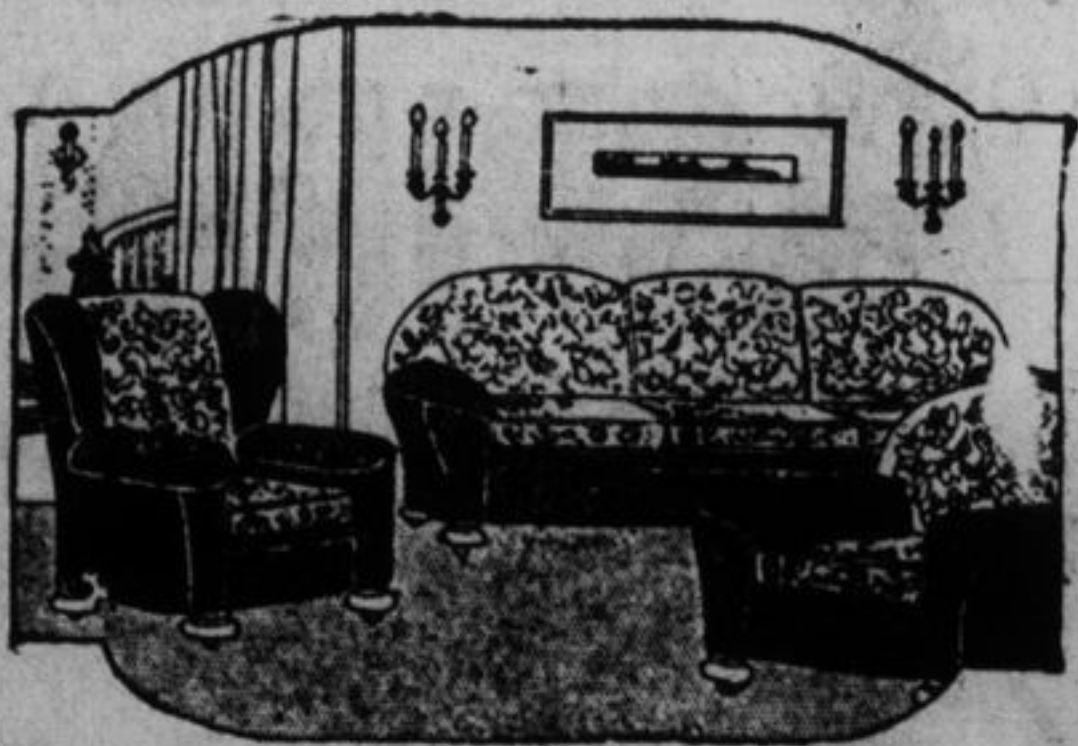
