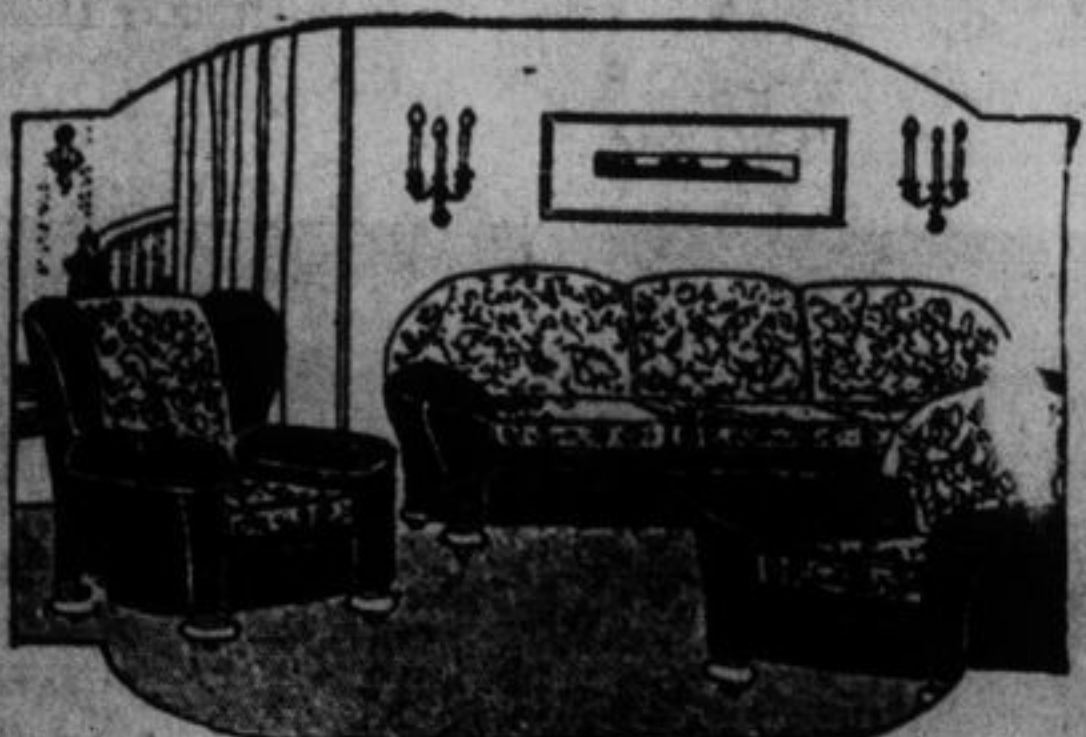

**THE KIWANIS HOLD
HALLOWE'EN MASQUERADE**

Capt. John Donnelly Tells
About the Release of the
Rapids Prince.

The weekly Kiwanis dinner held at the Frontenac Hotel on Monday evening was a most successful Halloween event, and drew a very large attendance, 107 members being present. Many of them were in disguise wearing masks and gaily colored costumes, representing different characters, some circus clowns, hobos, colored minstrels, American Indian, Little Boy Blue, King Solomon, Mephistopheles, Old Man, Lady, The Minister, Soldier, Victorian Gentleman, Yankee, and many others. It was a gala sight when in procession the members entered the dining room, decorated with cats and witches and with lamps converted into lanterns. The tables were all suitably decorated also, and the hotel manager, Mr. Higbee, had a special menu, while the service was excellent. Capt. John Donnelly was the special speaker of the evening.

Garnet Lockott, song leader, had a splendid programme with Trencor's orchestra, and everything went off with a bang from the start. The programme included a recitation by George Smith, whose reputation as an entertainer is well known, a song by the Kiwanis quartette composed of Harry Newman, Allan Lemmon, Fred, Wilson, W. McCallum, and a special number by Mat, Hanson, Jack McGill, R. Somerville and Harry Newman. The Kiwanis choruses were all heartily rendered.

The roll call proved most amusing as the president, Noble Steacy, undertook to name the members and the disguises proved too much for him in many cases.

"Wattle" Macnee was the booster and he provided many prizes, one of them being a \$500 fire insurance policy won by W. J. Keeley. The other winners were: Jean Denece, T. A. Kidd, I. Cohen, F. Evans, W. R. Givens, A. Lemmon, J. M. Campbell, S. Driver, H. T. Sargent, A. McGowan.

Rev. R. J. Wilson moved that the proceeds of the annual charity ball, up to the amount donated last year to the Y.M.C.A., be this year donated to the Hotel Dieu. W. Craig seconded the motion and it was unanimously carried. The dance will take place between Jan. 15th and 31st.

Frank Hoag stated that a request was received from the district governor for speakers to address Kiwanis clubs in Quebec, and he called for volunteers.

Captain Donnelly's Address.

Captain John Donnelly, of the Donnelly Salvage and Wrecking Company, was the special speaker of the evening and he gave an excellent address on the "Release of the Rapids Prince," illustrated with lantern pictures of the steamer stranded on a rocky ledge in the Lachine Rapids, and of different parts of the site. Captain Donnelly released the steamer under conditions never before met with in marine engineering in America, or in any other country in the world, and his achievement was a noteworthy one owing to the hazards of the undertaking.

The first picture showed the Rapids Prince in her dangerous position on a shelf of rock at the edge of the channel with the water rushing past at the rate of forty miles per hour. He described the extreme danger involved in going to and leaving the vessel, one man being drowned in rescuing the passengers just after the stranding of the ship.

He was notified by telegram on the day of the occurrence and asked to visit the scene and submit a tender which was accepted. He then described in detail the assembling of his plant and the necessary equipment for the job. He located a rock above the surface of the water, fifteen feet by thirty feet, and about 1,200 yards up stream from the steamer. On this rock he placed a boiler and steam winch, and after overcoming great difficulties fastened a cable to the steamer and pulled her off. The utmost vigilance and concerted action on the part of the crew on the steamer and the workmen at the winch was required and it was owing to the ingenuity in planning and executing the task that it was successfully carried out.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Captain Donnelly on the motion of J. M. Campbell, seconded by Elmer Davis. Mr. Campbell said that Captain Donnelly's feat was the most spectacular engineering achievement ever performed in Canada or elsewhere. It brought renown to himself and credit to the city of Kingston. Elmer Davis said that while Kingston has produced many eminent men in different walks of life, none stands higher than Captain John Donnelly whose feat is a great example in engineering achievement.

After tendering the vote of thanks to Captain Donnelly, Noble Steacy proposed that he be made an honorary member of the Kingston Kiwanis Club and his proposal was unanimously carried.

Wrecked Steamer Rebuilt.

Port Huron, Mich., Oct. 31.—Captain J. T. Reid, part owner of the steamer India, says the boat has been rebuilt at Port Dalhousie, and cleared for Buffalo to take on a grain cargo for Montreal. The India was wrecked in the Welland canal some time ago and was salvaged by Captain Reid and his wrecking crew.
