

"Instead of this each shop owner has a separate furnace and is burning anthracite, the most expensive



fuel, and there are forty fires when two or three steam boilers would do. This condition of waste cannot go on indefinitely, however, and the Kingston shopkeepers or the owners, will have to install modern distribution of heat in order to reduce the cost, while maintaining the highest degree of comfort."
