CONFERENCE CONCLUDES

With Address Friday on "Business in Politics" by Dean Skelton.

The thirty-first annual conference of the Theological Alumni Association of Queen's University was concluded on Friday morning with the last of the series of the chancellor's lectureship by Dean Skelton, his address being on "Business in Politics: The Scramble for Oil." A review of world political situation resulting from the struggle by the powerful nations for an adequate supply of oil was given by the speaker, as well as a study of the policies adopted by Great Britain in recent years.

The struggle for oil had become a complicated factor in nationalism, and the smaller nations, either backward in development or disrupted by war, had been forced into the melting pot for the larger countries to pick to pieces. In former days, before even coal was used largely as fuel, petroleum was used only for medicinal purposes or as a sacred oil, but now the situation is different. Great trusts and combines had grown out of the scramble, particularly in the United States, and the output in the entire world now approximated 350 million barrels yearly.

The Great War of 1914-18 had displayed the triumph of the motor-car over the steam locomotive, and Lord Curzon had once stated that the Allies had floated to victory on a sheet of oil. This latter fuel had also replaced coal for use in the world's navies, and it had become necessary for every maritime nation to have ample oil-fields at their command.

The United States had previously controlled most of the oil supply, but in recent years, Great Britain, by quiet organization, had assumed the monopoly and thereby strengthened her supremacy as mistress of the seas. Two-thirds of the ownership of fields in Central and South America, together with her large shares of districts in all parts of the world had passed into British hands.

Where there had been friction at first between America and Britain, this was not being arranged to the mutual satisfaction of these two great nations, as the good relations of the two governments were too strong to be imperilled by even the interests of oil.
