THE TEACHERS' INSTITUTE

Holding Annual Conference—
Lectures on Plant and Animals by Dr. Emery.

The annual convention of the Kingston Teachers' Institute opened at Queen's University on Thursday evening, with an address on "The Hidden Beauty of Plants and Animals," delivered by Dr. J. W. Emery of the Stratford Normal School. The address showed that even ordinary and common things have sometimes exquisite beauty because of their adaptation to the particular requirements of their existence. The lantern slides used to illustrate the remarks of the speaker were very beautiful, and the entire programme was greatly appreciated by the assembled teachers.

The sessions were resumed on Friday morning, when the convention was formally opened by President J. J. Carty. The series of nature study addresses were continued by Dr. Emery, in which he showed how to become acquainted with Mother Nature, and the alliance between nature study and literature. The morning session was featured with class singing by the pupils of Mrs. Gallaher, Robert Meek school, and of Miss Macdonald, Victoria school. Inspector J. Russell Stuart gave an instructive address on some practical school matters, such as the relation between the teacher and the parent.

On Friday afternoon the teachers were the guests of Major-General Sir A. C. Macdonell at the Royal Military College, where they were shown the historic college buildings, as well as the practical work of the cadets in training.

To Hold Another Sitting Here.
The American lawyers who were here on Monday and Tuesday in connection with the Chicago legal case before J. B. Walkem, K.C., examined witnesses at Cape Vincent on Wednesday and at Utica, N.Y., on Thursday. They wired Francis King, K.C., Canadian counsel for the Swigart estate, that they were obliged to return to Chicago Friday, but will hold another sitting before the commission here at a later date.
