Peculiar Clauses in Will.

In conformity with a wish expressed in his will, the body of Samuel S. Some time ago he was adjudged incompetent to manage his affairs and lived separate from his second wife.

Grading of Hogs.

The new regulations calling for the grading of all hogs sold at stockyards and abattoirs go into effect on January 1st, next, under the Live Stock and Live Stock Products Act. The different grades will be designated: Grade 1, select bacon, hogs weighing from 160 to 210 pounds, and suitable for choice bacon or Wiltshire sides; grade 2, thick smooth, not conforming to select bacon, but of same weight and of smooth conformation and finish; grade 3, shop hogs, weighing from 120 to 160 pounds and of smooth conformation and finish; grade 4, heavies, weighing from 210 to 260 pounds and of the select bacon type; grade 5, extra heavies, hogs weighing over 260 or 270 pounds, and of smooth conformation and finish; grade 6, feeders, hogs of 160 pounds or under; grade 7, roughs; hogs of rough conformation, any weight; grade 8, sows, all females that have raised one or more litters; with sub grade (a) weighing up to 350 pounds, sub-grade (b), all other sows; grade 9, stags. No hogs for sale can be removed from a grading centre or abattoir, until graded and a signed "release" has been furnished by the grader.
