## CANADIAN CLUBS IN U.S. ENTER HOCKEY ASSOCIATION

Five new clubs will be seen in action in the United States Amateur Hockey Association this coming season. Two new clubs were admitted during the final session of the annual meeting at Pittsburgh.

The new entrants are the Boston Hockey Club and the Victorias of Boston, the Royal Bank Club and the Canadian Hockey Club, both of New York and the Milwaukee Club.

The association will be divided into two groups—the eastern and western. The western group will be composed of Pittsburgh, Cleveland, St. Paul, Duluth, Eveleth, Minn., and Milwaukee.

The eastern group comprises Boston A. A.; Boston Hockey Club, Victorias, all of Boston; Quaker City, of Philadelphia; St. Nicholas, Royal Bank and Canadian Hockey Club, all of New York, and Westminster of New Haven.

An amendment to the rules, adopted today, makes it necessary to play all games to a finish. The free-style of play for the goal-tender was recommended. He may stop the puck in any manner with the exception of lying on the ice.

A central board of referees, under the supervision of President W. S. Haddeck, was appointed.

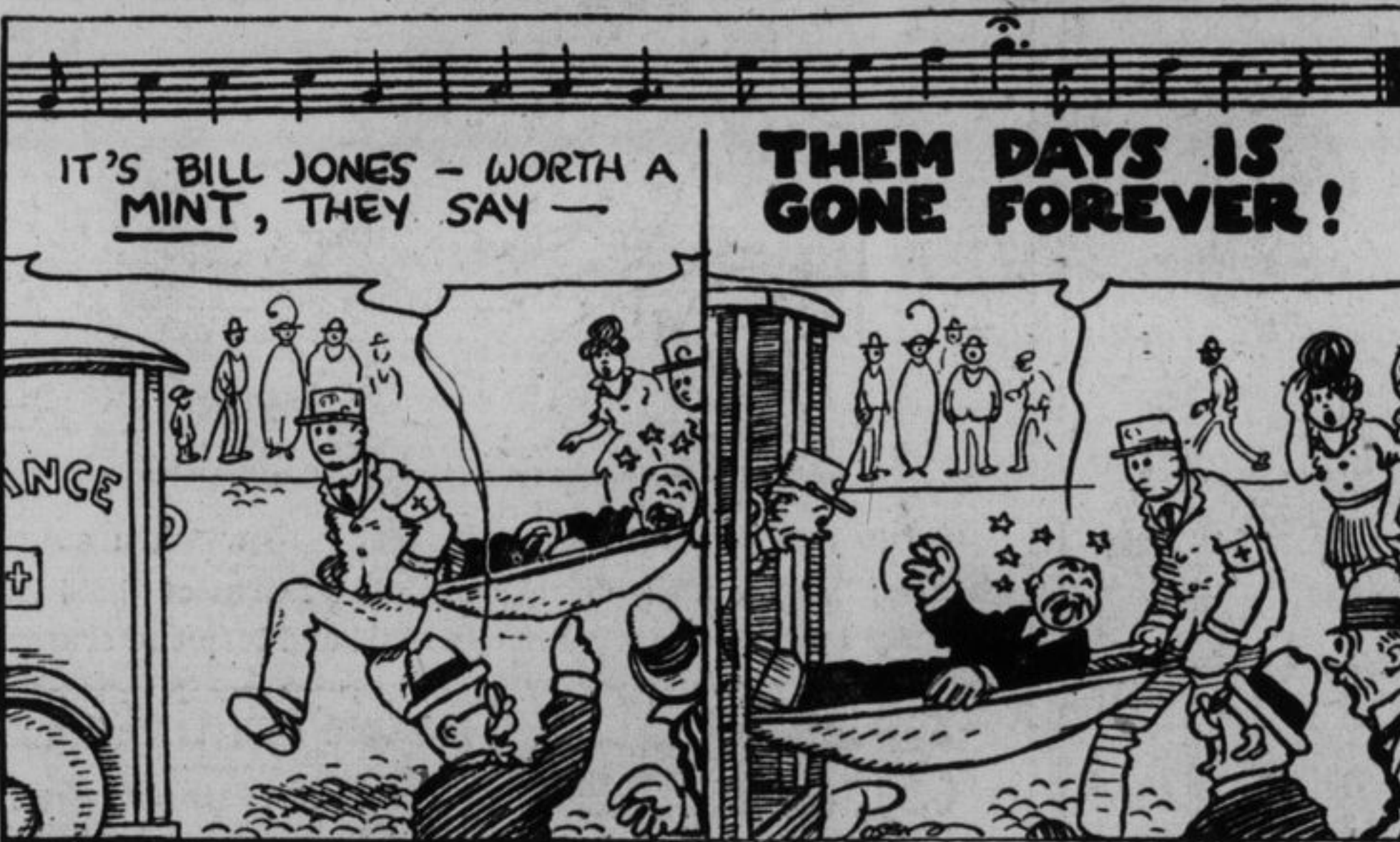
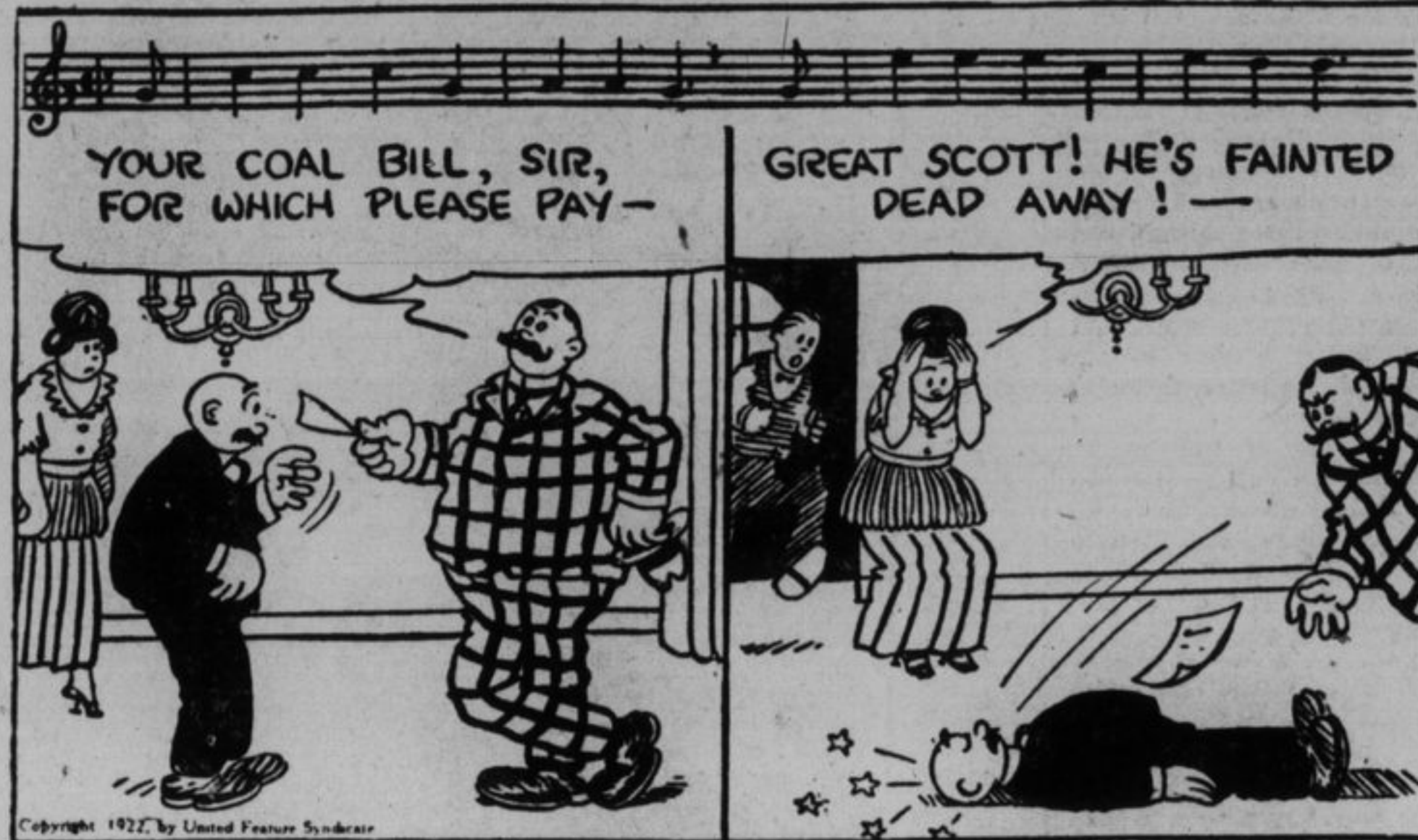
## Who Are Going to Run.

Montreal, Nov. 4.—Campbell Cope, game little flying wing of the Red and White squad, was confined to his bed yesterday with an injured knee, the result of a mishap in training two days ago. It is not likely that he will play at Queen's and, if not, Newton, the former Sarnia player, will get his chance at the roving position.

After Queen's showing against Varsity, the McGill players are none too hopeful of the result of today's game, but are determined to fight. With a backfield composed largely of new players at half line work, and outside wings who are either new at the game or who have been found wanting, the team is not in too good

a shape to go up against the strong Tri-color with any hopes of success. However, they will try their fortune with a set of fast, new plays that Coach Shaughnessy has worked out to meet the exigency that has faced the crippled Red and White squad this season.

## Boxing Agents.

Boxing agents for boxers—the boxing commission's new idea for doing away with managers—must not be matchmakers, promoters, managers or seconds, the commission has ruled, and they must work on the following scale: Ten per cent for a bout bringing \$1,000 or less; 5 per cent for bouts bringing from \$1,000 to \$5,000, and 3 per cent for everything over \$5,000.

## ST. LOUIS BROWNS TO RECEIVE REWARD

The Management Will Distribute \$20,000 Among Players.

A lump bonus of \$20,000 was distributed to the members of the St. Louis Browns shortly before the end of the season by Phillip De Catsby Ball, president of the club, as a reward for the team's best performance in twenty years.

It was said that the money was divided among the players on the basis of each player's performance during the 1922 season. The stars, including George Sisler, first baseman, Urban Shogler, pitcher, and others, were said to have received \$1,000, while some of the recruits were given \$200.

President Ball is understood to have given his players a bonus of \$5,000 during the middle of the season, when they forged into the American League lead, making a total of \$25,000 presented in bonuses by the Browns' owner.

The team finished in second place, one game behind the champion New York Yankees.

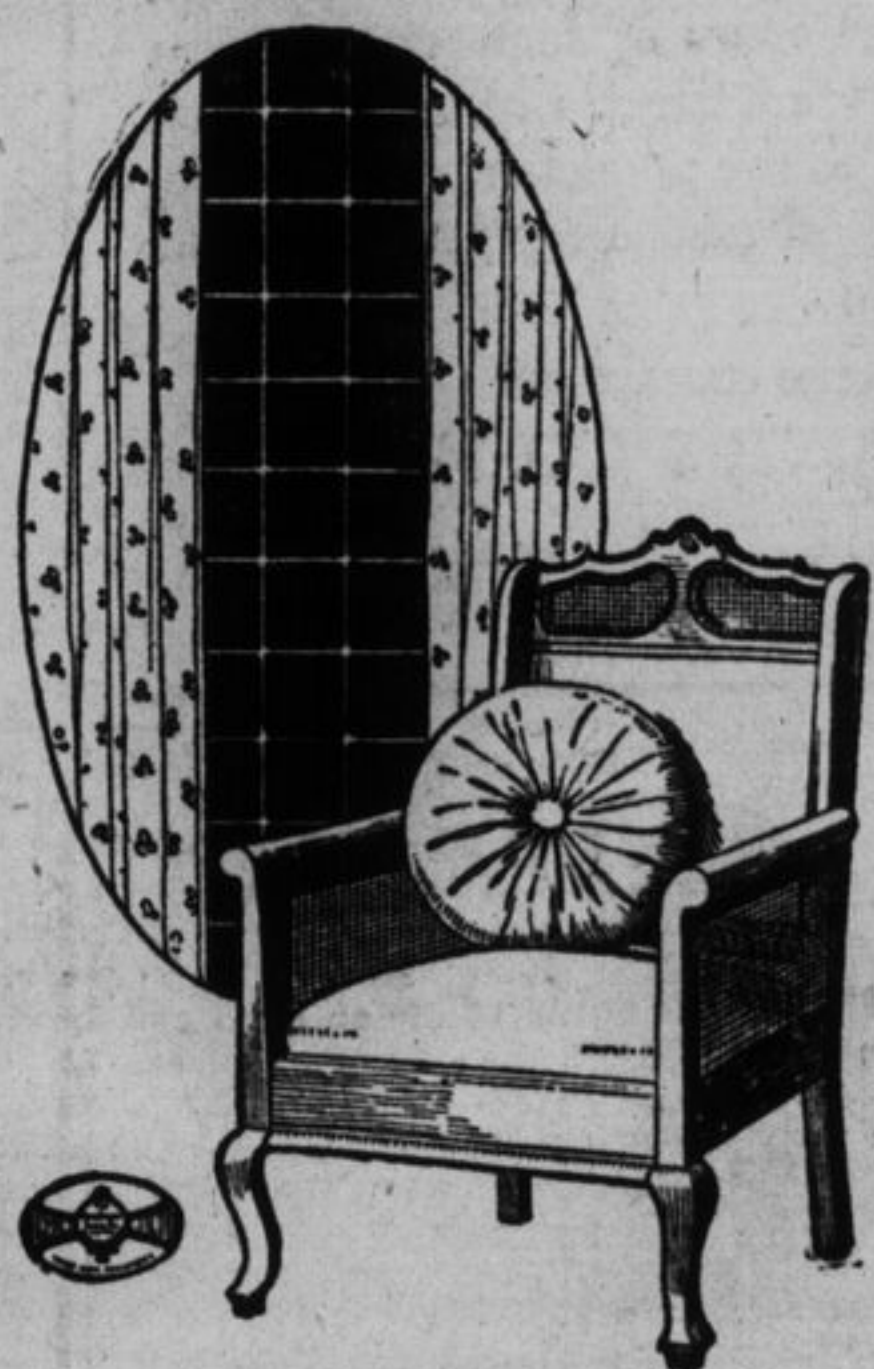
