DIRECTOR AWREY SERIOUSLY ILL

Queen's Coach Confined to His Home With Inflammatory Rheumatism.

There was a rumor around town this morning that Athletic Director George Awrey, of Queen's Univercity was confined to his home through serious illness and would not be able to carry on for the rest of the football season. It was known yesterday that he was at his home through sickness and unable to look after his team but the trouble was thought to be only a passing indisposition and no great importance attached to it.

When this morning's rumor got into circulation a Whig man immediately sought the members of Queen's Athletic Board for light on the matter. Professor Manley Baker, a member of the Board, told the Whig that the report was correct.

"Mr. Awrey is confined to his home under a doctor's care," he said, "with a very serious attack of inflammatory rheumatism. The Athletic Committee will carry on temporarily in his absence."

Coming at such a critical time of the season, with the titular game with Varsity on Saturday, the unfortunate illness of George Awrly has caused a great stir in the city and college circles. It is doubtful if he will be able to return to his work during the football season, according to all reports.

No announcement has been made by the Queen's Athletic Board as to a successor to carry on in Mr. Awrey's absence but a man will very likely be selected shortly.
