**ADMIRAL SIMS COMING
TO QUEEN'S AND R.M.C.**

Noted American Will Receive
a Civic Welcome on Fri-
day Morning.



ADMIRAL SIMS

Admiral Sir William Sims, U.S. N., who commanded the American navy throughout the war, will be the guest of Sir Archibald Macdonnell, commandant of the Royal Military College, and the staff on Friday from 11:30 a.m. until 3:15 p.m. In the morning he will inspect the cadets, and the different buildings and witness classes in physical training. He will have lunch with the commandant and officers, after which he will address the cadets. A ride will be given after the address, and at 3:15 he will leave.

Acting Mayor, R. E. Keht, is arranging the programme for a civic reception to Admiral Sims, and it is likely that it will take place between 10 and 11 a.m. Friday. The admiral, who by his unflinching attitude during the war won the admiration of all Canadian and British soldiers and sailors as well as all of the Allies, will be given a hearty welcome in Kingston. He is to arrive early Thursday evening and will receive an honorary degree at a special convocation of Queen's University.

MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION

Addressed by A. Beall and Dr. A. E. Ross—Vacation Bible School.

The Ministerial Association met in the First Baptist Church on Monday at 5 p.m. After the devotional period, led by Rev. J. S. Laflair, a business meeting was held. A welcome was extended to Rev. D. Laing who has returned to reside in the city. The executive committee reported that the third Sunday in November had been selected as General Hospital Sunday, and asked all the churches to co-operate to this end, making it understood among the members of their congregations that this was the day on which they would have the opportunity of giving liberally to this worthy institution. The secretary was instructed to write to Rev. W. Taylor Dale, expressing the unanimous appreciation of his help and fellowship in the past, and sincere regrets at his departure from the city to take up labors in another field of service. The preparations for the annual week of prayer were left in the hands of the executive, to report back at the next regular meeting. A communication from Dr. E. Ryan, requesting a new schedule of speakers for the Sunday morning services at Rockwood for the year 1933 was referred to the executive for arrangement.

Rev. T. W. Savary, the president who occupied the chair, introduced the subject of a vacation bible school, the matter being left over for further consideration. Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson also suggested a national thanksgiving to be held in a united way, instead of the several denominational services as now being held annually. As this involved a larger consideration the matter was left over till a later date. Rev. Dr. Wilson's name was added to the executive to replace Rev. W. T. Dale.

Following the business session, a supper was served by Baptist ladies, after which two addresses were given, one from A. Beall, M.A. who is giving special lectures to the boys and girls in the public schools on the sacredness of the human body. It is the idea of the speaker to impress on the minds of the young the fact that a noble soul cannot exist within an unclean body, and the great necessity of keeping the mind clean and stored with the pure and true and the beautiful thoughts.

Dr. A. E. Ross, medical superintendent was the speaker of the evening, and in his usual interesting manner talked to the ministers on the subject "Hospital Problems". The speaker dealt at some length on the dangers and difficulties of infection, and the extreme caution necessary on the part of those who came in contact with the sick. In the operating room especially it was very unwise to have any visitor, owing to the fact that infection could so easily be carried on the clothing, and be retained thereon for so long a period. Visitors to sick rooms should also exercise great care and assist the hospital authorities in preventing complications.

Hearty notes of thanks were passed to the ladies, to Mr. Beall, and to Dr. Ross.
