Christmas Mail for Overseas. The post office authorities point out that parcels or mail matter intended for delivery in European countries before Christmas, should be mailed at an early date as possible, preferably within the next two weeks, at the very latest in time to connect with the steamer "Melita" sailing from St. John, on December 9th.

Much Coal Coming Here. If the weather remains favorable for two weeks longer, the coal situation, in Kingston at least, will be solved as thousands of tons are arriving here from Oswego and other shipping points every week. Besides the local vessels making regular runs back and forth, several cargoes have been brought here by other steamers from American ports.

Commenced Her Trial. Charged with a serious offense against a girl fourteen years of age, James Morris, seventeen years old, appeared before Magistrate Page, Brockville, and was committed for trial. The accused, who resides in the Rear of Yonge and Escot was released on bail of \$10,000 furnished by himself and his father, John Morris.

To Address Board of Trade. The next meeting of the Board of Trade has been arranged for Dec. 12th, when Col. John A. Cooper, Toronto, will discuss the question of "Canada's Need—Trade Agencies." Col. Cooper spent a number of years in New York as one of the agents of the federal union government, and is therefore able to discuss the matter with a great deal of detail. Col. Cooper is well-known in Kingston and will be heartily welcomed on his coming to the city.

Dancing began at 10.30 p.m. and continued to 1 a.m. McGrath's orchestra furnished the music.

Satisfied With Randolph. As an evidence that the members of the Varsity football club were not dissatisfied with the hotel accommodation in Kingston, we have only to publish the contents of a letter written by T. Reed, secretary of the University of Toronto athletic association to L. T. Welch, manager of the Hotel Randolph of Kingston, in which he says the cancellation of the arrangements made was due to the fact that the team to go to a quiet place like Belleville for the night, and proceed to Kingston the next day. He is not wealthy if he does drive a car. Very seldom he has a surplus in the bank. His money is all invested in stocks, accounts, etc. The wholesalers with whom he deals sell on stated terms. He cannot pay them with excuses. If he is courteous enough to give you credit, show him equal courtesy by paying him promptly without giving him extra worry and expense. He has no security. What you buy is soon consumed he cannot get it back. He trusts you on your honor alone. Is there any other who does as much for you? He asks no favors, needs no charity, but is entitled to a square deal. You have read this. Now stop and think. Be square—be fair—the first."
